World War II Stars and Stripes Honor Flight to Washington, D.C.

Back in 1942 at the tender age of sixteen ,Stuart Fredenberg joined the U.S. Marines. All that was needed at that time was his mother's signed permission. It was the middle of WWII and Stuart headed off to The South Pacific Theatre. While there he participated in 1 sea battle, 11 landings from Guadalcanal to the Mariana's, which included Iwo Jima, Okinawa, Guam and many others whose names are now relegated to the history books.

And now, 69 years later he was chosen as a WWII veteran to be honored in the Stars & Stripes Flight to Washington, D.C. The purpose of this flight was to show the veterans the WWII Memorial that was dedicated to them in 2004. An Honor

Flight consists of 200 Veterans and 200 guardians.

Stuart's adventure started about a week before the flight when his guardian, David Endl from Jefferson, WI stopped at Stuart' home and introduced himself. They have since become good friends.

Prior to the flight, Stuart received a package and a letter of instructions for the 11/6/10 flight. Each vet received a blue windbreaker and his guardian, a red one. Both received identification tags. The letter contained their itinerary.

Stuart reported to General Mitchell Airport where his guardian, Dave was waiting for him. The family goodbyes behind them, they were off at 6:30 a.m. They arrived in Washington at 8:15 a.m. Tour buses came right to the plane and the volunteer crew helped them deplane and board the busses. They had a police escort from the Airport into Washington.

Then began their amazing tour. They stopped first at the WWII monument. As you might imagine, this was a very moving experience. Then it was on to the Korean War Memorial, Iwo Jima Memorial, Arlington National Cemetery for the changing of the guard at the tomb of the Unknown soldier, the Pentagon and the Air Force Memorial. It was an emotional filled day of experiences.

Their arrival at Mitchell Field at 10:01 P.M. was yet another exciting experience. Approximately 6000 people greeted them. Each vet and his guardian went through the line, shaking everyone's hand. An Honor Guard and Bagpipers gave them a final hero's welcome home.

Stuart was discharged from the Marines in December of 1945, now a young man of nineteen years in age but so much more mature in his experiences. We can never thank those brave men enough.


Harry will be deeply missed, but never forgotten.

Paul G. Trupke


Oct.16,1926-Jan. 10, 2011
