JAMES CRAWLEY SUICIDES.

Former Grain Inspector Shoots Himself on the Lake Shore.

James Crawley, formerly a grain inspector at the chamber of commerce, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head with a 32 calibre revolver, yesterday morning at 11:50 o'clock, near the Chicago and North-Western railway tracks at the Rushing tunnel-park. Mr. Crawley resided at 372 Irving place and had been in poor health for some time. Ill health caused him to resign his position last fall and he had since been engaged in putting upon the market a water heater of his own invention. He had been planning a vacation trip with his wife for the benefit of his health, but of late had appeared depressed. When he left home he told his wife he was going to the barber shop, but instead he is supposed to have gone directly to the lake shore.

Mr. Crawley was born and raised in Eagle and was for many years and prior to his removal to Milwaukee, manager of the Eagle grain elevator, owned by Harvey Clemons. He was married here to Miss Mable Robinson. He leaves, besides his widow, three brothers—Joseph H., Willis, and Louis, and two sisters—Mary Jane Crawley and Mrs. Geo. B. Olds. News of his death in this manner came as a surprise to his many Eagle friends.
