### Thomasina Wilson Day

EAGLE — Thomasina Wilson Day died March 16, 1996, at the age of 80 as spring thawed the ice of Eagle Springs Lake and Canada geese returned to the pond behind her home of 51 years. She loved feeding and watching waterfowl and other wildlife there.

Raised in Milwaukee, the last of three daughters of Glasgow immigrants, Catherine and Thomas Rae, Ina represented the passing of a generation, but she nurtured several subsequent generations that hold her memory dear.

In her youth she was active in the St. Andrews Society and the Drama League, attended Downer College, and sang on her own radio program. She treasured her Scottish heritage and kept close links with the Rae, Kerr, Paterson, and McEwan family relatives on both sides of the Atlantic.

Devoted to friends and family, she was a resident of Eagle from 1945, but she valued ties with her Milwaukee bridge club as well as the lake crowd. She helped establish the Eagleville PTA, was a founding member of the Eagle Springs Lake Yacht Club, was supportive of the Antique Automobile Club, Pierce Arrow Society, and many community groups including the Mukwonago Congregational Church.
