William Meredith Dead.

News of the death of William Meredith, which occurred at his farm home west of the village on Monday, Jan. 7th, caused great surprise and sorrow to his friends in Eagle. Although he had not been in good health for some time, his death was not expected. He was born in Llanidloes, South Wales, May 10, 1860, and came to America about twenty-four years ago, locating in Milwaukee where he was employed in the N. W. straw works. Six years ago he went to Vancouver Island, B. C. and after one year returned and engaged in farming in Cambria, Wis. In March, 1895, he came to Eagle to occupy the Jas. Black farm which he purchased. He was married in July 1892 to Miss Annie L. Roberts of Cambria by whom he had four children—Irving, Gladys, Dyllis and Beryl all of whom are living. During his brief residence here he won the reputation of an honest, energetic and industrious citizen, kind father and neighbor. His untimely death will be

mourned by all. In religion he was a member of the Welsh M. E. church; was school district clerk at the time of his death. The funeral took place from the family home Thursday afternoon, Rev. Tuttle of the M. E. church officiating. The Welsh choir of Milwaukee, composed of David Williams, Miss Mamie Williams, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Jones, and Miss Bessie Jones sang two Welsh selections. The decorations of the casket consisted of costly wreaths and flowers from his friends in Eagle and Milwaukee and a pillow of flowers from the Sunshine club. There was a large attendance at the funeral. Besides his family, he leaves his parents, Richard and Elizabeth Meredith, and one brother, in Wales.
