

OBITUARY

Mrs. Emeline Hinkley Pardee passed away on Wednesday morning, Aug. 31st, at the home of her son Harold.

She was born June 27, 1848 at Eagle, Wis., being the third daughter born to the late Mr. and Mrs. Alvira Rockwell Hinkley, pioneer settlers and life long residents of Eagle. On Jan. 7, 1875 she was united in marriage to Adelbert Jared Pardee, who came here from Oneida county, New York, and was a cheesemaker by trade, and later worked the A. R. Hinkley farm.

There were four children, Harold who survives his mother; Don who died March 20, 1927; Emily who died July 29, 1925; and a babe who died in infancy. Besides her son Harold, Mrs. Pardee is survived by one sister Mrs. Grace Hinkley Pardee of Watsonville, California, one granddaughter Mable Pardee of Eagle and a number of nieces and nephews, and children of her two brothers and four sisters, who with her husband preceded her in death. The funeral took place from the home at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon. The number of relatives, friends and neighbors who attended, by their presence evidenced the friendship and esteem in which the deceased was held during her ninety years of life in this one community. While of a quiet and home-loving nature nevertheless Mrs. Pardee was greatly interested in community and public welfare, and when she lived on the farm was for some time clerk of School District No. 1, thereby making life-long friends of some of the teachers whom she helped to get their first school. The funeral services were in charge of Rev. Samuel Beers, pastor of the Eagle M. E. Church, with interment in Oak Ridge cemetery. The bearers were John Wilton, John Skidmore, Ned Burton, Lee Thomas, Shirley Oberne and Raymond Duszold, the latter of Milwaukee, and who as a boy spent many happy vacations at Mrs. Pardee's and the "Cobblestone" as the old home was familiarly called.
