Mrs. Ruby Baker Box, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Baker of this city and wife of Floyd Box of Little Prairie, died at the farm Saturday evening as a result of convulsions following child birth. A little daughter born on Friday will live to join the father and grandparents in mourning the untimely taking of a sweet spirit. The funeral was held Tuesday with interment at Little Prairie.

Ruby May Baker was the eldest in a family of five born to Mr. and Mrs. Richard Baker of the town of Troy, where she was born July 3, 1887, and where she lived until she became the bride of Floyd Box June 12, 1912, and came with him to the Box farm three miles south of this village, where she passed away. In both localities she enjoyed the high regard of all who knew her. The very large attendance and beautiful flowers at the funeral Tuesday bespoke the sympathy and loss which all feel. The services were held at the home and the Little Prairie church, Rev. Loreuz Knutzen speaking the words of consolation, with Jerome Trewyn, Mrs. W. H. Uglow, Mr. and Mrs. George Cramp and Mrs. Jennie Ray furnishing the musical numbers. Cousins acted as bearers. They were Will and T. C. Baker, James Lyons, Frank Dunham, Robert Stanton and Will Bird. Interment was in the Little Prairie cemetery.

The brothers and sisters are Ralph and Levi Baker, on the old homestead, and Emma and Eunice, who, with the parents, have moved to Whitewater. All, with a host of other relatives from the neighborhood and neighboring localities, were present at the last sad rites.
