Mrs. John Burg Dies at Monches

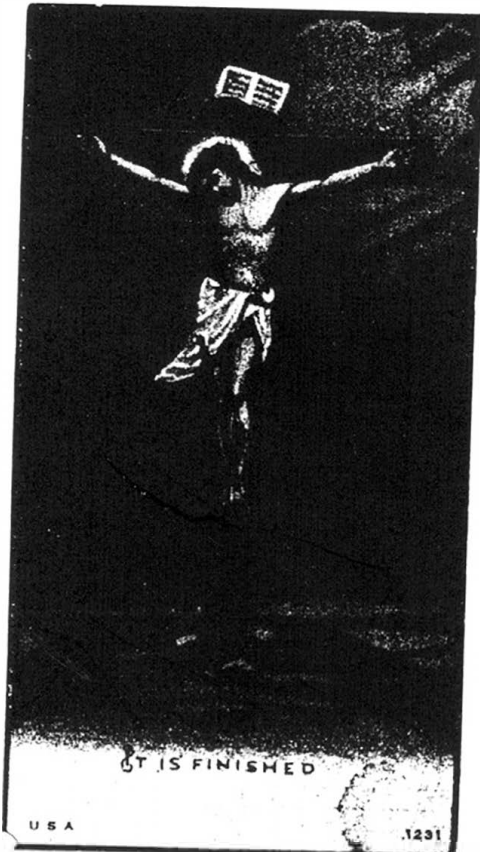
On Wednesday morning, Feb. 26th Mrs. John Burg, one of Monches highly esteemed residents passed away at her home in this village after a two week's illness, the result of a heart attack.

The deceased, the former Mary Purtell, was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Purtell, pioneer resident of this village. She was born Dec. 5, 1860 and spent her entire life in this village. Her marriage to John Burg, operator of the Burg Roller Mills, took place June 6, 1881. Besides her aged husband she is survived by five sons and four daughters: Joseph and Edmund of Milwaukee, Ralph and Welford of Slinger, Leo of West Bend; May (Mrs. M. O'Keane) of Milwaukee, Genevieve (Mrs. Joseph Fleming) of Monches, Nellie (Mrs. Steve Fleming) of Pine Lake and Sophia at home. A son, Dr. Robert Burg preceded her in death in May, 1936. She is also survived by three brothers, Dr. John Purtell, Dr. Thomas Purtell and Francis L. Purtell, of Milwaukee.

Four surviving sisters are Mrs. F. J. Donnelly, wife of Dr. F. J. Donnelly, of North Lake; Mrs. Catherine Beston, of North Lake; Mrs. Margaret Ennis, of Milwaukee; and Sr. M. Regina (Nellie Purtell) a member of the Order of Sisters of Charity, who is a worker in a leper colony in Louisiana. Twenty-seven grandchildren also survive.

The funeral was held from the Berndt Funeral Home at Hartford to St. John's Church, Monches, on Saturday morning. The pastor, Rev. W. F. Restle offered the High Mass of Requiem. Interment was made in St. John's cemetery.

Mrs. Burg was a lifelong member of St. John's Church and a member of the Ladies' Altar Society, members of which formed an honorary escort at the funeral.
