

EAGLE TOWN CRIER By Carrie Peavy

Did you know that Eagle once had another local newspaper besides the Eagle Quill? A recent museum visit from Eagle Spring Lake native John Nygren sparked to life another story that begged to be told. In the early 1970s John edited, published and distributed the Eagle Town Crier. His very first issue held a promise from him to do his utmost to keep readers informed of events in their growing community. A closer look reveals enormous effort being put into accomplishing that goal.

John wore many hats during his early years which helped to equip him for this task. He became a jet aircraft mechanic in the USAF. After serving in Vietnam, he sold advertising for the *Union Grove Sun* to large furniture stores, car dealerships, banks and grocery stores in Racine, Kenosha, Paddock Lake, Union Grove and Sturtevant. This work built up a weekly circulation of 15,000 for the paper.

The October 16, 1970 edition of the Eagle Town Crier announced the arrival of a new Davison 33 over and under press purchased in Shawano, WI, which Russell Beaver and Tim Boyden helped unload and install.

John encouraged readers to patronize the many vendors who had supported this venture since the advertisers would be helping to pay for the press and allowing for the free distribution of the newspaper. You could purchase Red well as highlights from the Eagle Youth Wing Pecos boots from Hill's Department Store, "save a wee bit more on 'most everything you buy" at Krestan's A.G. Store, and for

\$1.75 enjoy "1/2 half hen or rooster with trimmings" at Sasso's. Frohne Electric, Ty's Tap, Ludwig TV, Eagle Sport Center, Kroll's Resort & Grocery, Diamond Drive-Inn, Brittingham & Hixon Lumber Co., Loftus Chiropractic, and Mealy's Furniture and Funeral Service also placed ads, to name just a few.

John proudly explained how this press could print on two different heads on both sides of the paper at the same time. After typing all of his information, he would lay it out and use metal plates like those the big dailies used. He printed 1000 copies of each biweekly edition and folded them himself. They were placed in gas stations, grocery stores and restaurants in Eagle, Mukwonago, East Troy, Troy Center, Palmyra, North Prairie, and Dousman.

Residents from Eagle and its surrounding communities would generally call John at his home with announcements of wedding engagements, anniversaries, graduations, senior citizen meetings, and benefit dances held at the American Legion. Horseshoe League, Little League, and Kettle Moraine Dartball scores as Center, Eagleville Homemakers, Bluebirds, PTO, and Scouts were also regularly posted.

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The classifieds offered sales of anything from pedigreed toy poodles, fresh eggs, vegetables, berries, rhubarb, worms, nightcrawlers, Wally Pipp's cement lawn figures, or a 1963 Valiant Hard Top and more. Services such as watch or clock repair were advertised along with contact information from seekers of farm work, odd jobs, babysitting and ironing.

You could work a crossword puzzle or read witty quips and quotes. Readers shared recipes, thanks for cards and gifts after a bout with illness, expressions of sympathy after losses, as well as helpful household tips such as buttoning cuffs to the fronts of shirts to keep sleeves from tangling with other wash in your washer.

Editorials included problems such as the placement of buoys on Touhy's Bay or challenges residents faced with the DNR during a time of great transition for Eagle and nearby areas. John kept encouraging citizens to go to civic meetings to stay informed of new proposals.

John also picked up tidbits from town and school board meetings:



When John moved to Arizona, his mother, Vivian, took over the task of the *Crier* for a short time. From 1986 to 2008 John published the 52-page, full-color *Near North Visitors Guide* and built up a monthly circulation of 18,000 throughout the State of Wisconsin.

EAGLE QUILL Nov. 30, 1906

The village of Eagle needs a fire department and we are going to tell the property owners of it. Inasmuch as we need a department, when shall we act upon the question? Shall we wait until the village is burned or shall we drag the question into politics and give some one a chance to ride into office on the issue? Are there any who are opposed to a fire department? If so, write your views on white paper and get them published in the Eagle Quill. Do you want anything fairer than that? If you do not care which way it goes, then stand by the majority. From a selfish standpoint a political office is a very small matter. It is not worth the time of an active, energetic citizen. But from a patriotic standpoint an office looks like a mountain to us. It would look still larger if the citizens would do unto officers as they wish officers to do unto them. makes no difference what your politics are or who is in office, so long as the man in office is honest and does what is for the interests of the people. In supporting a move for a fire department we do so from a humane standpoint. Who in this village would be willing to allow himself or a member of a family to loose a life in a fire, for the privilege of carrying two silver dollars in his pockets instead of one silver dollar. It is no uncommon occurance to learn of lives lost by fire even in cities where there are the best of departments. again, fire insurance is only a part of the property value and the remainder is lost. Assuming that your home is worth \$1500.00 and you have \$800,00 insurance on it, did you ever think that the other \$700.00 of your hard earnings are exposed to every other risk within distance. No matter how careful you may be that cuts a figure only in favor of your neighare not dangerous to You bors. them but they may be dangerous to over, neighbors. Think it you. If you agree with us, all well and good; if not we will greet you just the same in the morning.
