Frank W. Robinson.

The Green Bay Gazette of July 7th, says: "The body of Frank W. Robinson, who died at the home of his sister, Mrs. J. E. Crowley, in Milwaukee, arrived in Green Bay last evening over the Milwaukee road at 8:45. The remains were accompanied to this city by his wife and three sisters, Mrs. J. E. Crowley, Mrs. C. L. Botsford, of Milwaukee; Mrs. Elmer J. Davis, Winona, Minn.; J. E. Crowley, a brother-in-law, Mrs. J. A. Crawford, a cousin, of Chicago. Telegrams were received stating that a brother, Phil E. Robinson, of Missouri Valley, Neb., would attend and William K. McFayden, of Danville, Ill., a brother of Mrs. Robinson, would also attend. A delegation of Elks from Manistiquette, Mich., with Mr. Freeman, his business partner, have arranged to arrive in the afternoon. The funeral will be held from the family residence, 431 Walnut St., to-morrow, at 4 p. m. Father Foster will officiate. Interment will be at Woodlawn."

And The Quill adds to the above: "Frank W. Robinson was born in Eagle 54 years ago and was the son of Lucian W. and Eliza Bovee Robinson, early settlers here. He attended the common school at Eagle and spent his early years here. His parents have preceded him in death. He was married to Miss Katharine Alice McFayden, at Green Bay, June 22, 1892, at Christ Church. He leaves besides his widow, three children, Phillip, aged 12 years; Kathleen, aged 10 years, and Frank, aged 2 1-2 years, and three sisters and one brother. He was a grandson of Phillip and Charlotte Pittman Bovee. Mr. Robinson has many relatives in and around Eagle, where he spent his boyhood days, who will sorrow over his untimely death.

When he reached manhood he entered into business enterprises and at the time of his death was estimated to be worth \$100,000.00. He was a member of the lumber firm of Robinson & Freeman, and of the Engadin Lumber Co., and Robinson & Ferguson General Merchandise Co., all of Gould City, Upper Michigan.

Although he was in ill health for two years he did not realize that his illness was serious and death came unexpected.
