DEATH OF AN EARLY SETTLER

Robert Smart was born at a place some three miles north of this village Saturday eve., Aug. 5th, was born in Hull, Yorkshire, England, in 1825 and came to this country with his parents in 1836, settling at first in Michigan. The family remained in Michigan and also a portion of the time in Indiana until 1833 when Robert came here from Michigan when a boy of twelve to Prairieville where he assisted Uncle Isaac Smart in 1837, driving an ox team all the way, over what was then almost a roadless, unbroken wilderness, with no path to guide them but the Indian trail.

He remained in Prairieville (Watertown) working for his uncle Isaac Smart who was the earliest pioneer settler of that town, and for others, until 1845 when he came to this town settling on the place where he had once lived up to the time of his death. In his early days he drove teams of six or eight yokes of oxen and a good many teams south of Watertown were frequently broken by the long line of wagons moving over undriven by his strong hand.

In 1850 Robert Smart was married to Miss Jane Culbre who still survives him together with six children, Mrs. H. E. Miller, Mrs. Belle Chaffin, Mrs. Wm. Atkins, Miss Mable, Mr. Frederick and Arctie R. Smart, all of whom reside in this county except Mrs. Belle Chaffin who is in Kenosha. His aged mother past ninety, still survives him and resides near North Prairie. He was a good farmer, an accomodating, friendly neighbor, an affectionate husband and father, a man to be reckoned in his dealing and his whose presence will be missed in many a social gathering and by many warm friends.
