EHS CELEBRATES 30 YEARS

On July 15, 1989 a group of people dedicated to preserving the history of Eagle met on the back steps of what was then the library. Interest and membership spread by word of mouth and membership grew.

The first of several annual holiday tours of homes was held on December 12, 1992. Tickets to the events could be purchased for \$4 each, and proceeds were used to obtain additional local artifacts. Raffle tickets were available for 50 cents each or 3 for a dollar. The well-attended, walking tours ended at the Town/Village Hall with a drawing at 4:30 pm.

When the library moved into its new building at 820 E. Main Street in 1994, the Eagle Historical Society acquired its new and current home (the Partridge-Zipprich home).

EHS became affiliated with the Wisconsin State Historical Society.

EAGLE TELEPHONE COMPANY

EAGLE

The Eagle Telephone Company was organized in 1902 and provided day and night service. It conducted its business above the Bank of Eagle until it was destroyed by fire, in the space now occupied by Rustix, and for a time the exchange was run from 125 Main Street. From about the 1940s the cobblestone building (now Ultimate Image) at 205 Grove Street was its home.

Shirley Matters worked at that location in the late 1950s. She recalls using a board with plugs and having to plug into the phone number the customers were calling. There was a bed available for night operators to rest in, but if the board would light up they would need to get up and answer it. She has many fond memories of her job. People were very nice to her. It could be difficult to know when you could transfer a call as they were not allowed to listen in to see if they were still talking. Margie Smart was the chief operator and in charge of bookkeeping so that bills were recorded correctly. Cash or check payments were accepted by the phone company.

Calls for emergencies such as a fire would get plugged into the fire station and the siren would go off. Shirley did not get many emergency calls, but other operators did. In 1919 teenager Louise Breidenbach, a new employee, was awakened in the early hours by the noise of robbers breaking into the bank below the telephone office. They had cut the wires from the telephone company office to the pole across the street but were unaware that there were wires from the back of the building. She was able to call the bank president who notified the marshall of the robbery in progress. After a gun battle and chase the robbers escaped without robbing the vault. In 1931 operator Luella Anderson was carried from the burning telephone building after being awakened by smoke but only after notifying Palmyra and Mukwonago by switchboard of the fire. The fire had started in Sasso's saloon and spread to the Eagle Bank and Telephone Company above the bank. Operators took their jobs seriously and were very dedicated.

Do you remember sharing a party line and have stories to share? Why not stop in the museum to see a renovated switchboard?
