SPRAGUE FAMILY HISTORY By Jesse Steinke

Have you ever wondered the story behind a name? Why a road or town is named what it is? Is there any historical significance to it? As a descendant of the Sprague family and spending a large proportion of my childhood on the historical farmstead I've always been interested in learning more about the farm and the road. Here is the history that I've been able to find behind the Spragues, Sprague Farm, and Sprague Road.

Prior to being Sprague Road it was County Highway NNN. It was still named this on the 1975 County Highway Map, where on the 1978 County Highway Map it was not labeled. On July 18, 1978 the Waukesha County Board of Supervisors made an extensive set of revisions to highway names; the details were not outlined, but it seems this is when it was transferred to the Town and called Sprague Road. I wasn't able to find any specific details of why Sprague was chosen other than it being the largest and oldest farm on the road. Spragues have had a long history in Eagle and the United States and here is their story.

The Sprague lineage came from 3 brothers and their father who came to America from England in 1628, and were some of the earliest settlers in the Malden/Melrose/Charlestown areas of Massachusetts, (just North of Boston). During the 1630s they grew into prominence and held many government and military positions. The father, Lieutenant Ralph Sprague (1599-1650) and son, Captain John Sprague (1624-1692) were commissioned to protect the town from the Natives. The son fought against the Indian inhabitants in King Philip's War from 1675-1678. (The Spragues of Malden Massachusetts, 1923) A few additional interesting descendants include the following.

Captain John Sprague's niece was Martha Sprague (1676-?) who was "inflicted with the Devil" and made numerous accusations of witchcraft in Salem, Massachusetts.

Captain John Sprague's son, Ensign Phineas Sprague (1665-1736) was also a soldier in King Philip's War. His son and Grandson; Phineas Jr. (1700-1775) and Sergeant Phineas Sprague, III (1725-1805) respectively, served at the Battle of Lexington. The Grandson possibly served at Bunker Hill. One book says he fought at it, another said he was stuck on the wrong side of the river due to British gun boats preventing his crossing. Junior was 75 years old when he marched against the British at Lexington. He passed away on the same day at Bunker Hill. History books state he died in Malden, across the river and 2 miles North of Bunker Hill with no evidence of him fighting at Bunker Hill. There is family lore that he was shot from across the River when he was mooning the British.

The next son was Dr. John Sprague (1754-1803), a Regiment Surgeon in the Revolution who was twice taken prisoner by the British and was the father of Dr. Frederick Augustus Sprague who moved to Eagle.

Generation 1 Dr. Frederick Augustus Sprague (1794-1864), a descendant of the Pilgrim Mary Cushman who came over on the *Mayflower* in 1620, and wife Bridget, nee Moody, left Massachusetts in the 1820s for Richfield, Ohio. In the early 1840s his house was destroyed by fire and with lands bought at the height of the land speculation he was \$10,000 in debt. (\$290,000 in 2018) He sold everything, paid off his debts and traveled 1500 miles overland exploring and finally settled on the Eagle prairie on July 11, 1842, buying 200 acres in Section 26, at \$5 apiece from John Parsons. He built an 18' x 24' one-anda-half story house. It was stated that this was probably the first frame house plastered inside and out within the township. His land was on the east side of Markham. Road from LO to NN and included where the Post Office and the Fox Chase subdivision are today. The house

mentioned is believed to be Rob Day's house.

In a letter to his brother he stated, "My farm is well watered and has about 160 acres that there is not a bush or stump nor stone on, level and smooth and every foot as rich as the richest garden in Massachusetts. The prairie on which I live is a complete flower garden every week and almost every day from the first of March to the first of October." "Our boys have killed plenty of deer, partridges, prairie hens, wild geese, wild ducks, and sand hill cranes — a kind of bird from five to six feet high and caught 12 of the largest coons I ever saw, some of them weighing about 30 pounds."

At this time he had 9 children, 7 boys and 2 girls living, while losing a boy (Isaac) and a girl in Ohio. His 9 children that made it to Eagle were Frederic Augustus II, Romeo, William Bingham, Joseph, John Q, Juliet, Peter, Hiram, Elizabeth and Susannah. Of them, all but William, Joseph and Peter stayed in Eagle.

In the 1859 Platt Map, Frederick owned 400 acres in Sections 23, 26 and 28 including 80 acres where Old World Wisconsin buildings currently are. His Son Romeo owned 160 Acres east of 67 and north of NN and helped lay out Eagle Center (Village of Eagle). His other son Joseph owned 160 acres which is still owned by their descendants off Sprague Road.




Figure 2 1859 Eagle Platt Map, Sprague lands boxed.
