

DEATH OF H. M. ACKLEY

Once Prominent Business Man—an Invalid for Years

The final summons came to Hon. H. M. Ackley Thursday, Dec. 19, 1912, at the residence on West avenue. He had been an invalid for years and the end was not unexpected. He would have been eight-six years old had he lived until Jan. 12.

Henry M. Ackley was born in Ellisburgh, Jefferson county, N. Y., Jan. 12, 1827, and was descended from old English ancestry on both sides of the family. His father, Gen. Gad Ackley, served in the war of 1812, and his grandfather, Barnabas Pond, was a major in the Revolutionary war.

Mr. Ackley came to Oconomowoc in 1857 and engaged in farming. In 1860 he moved to Nashotah Mission, where for five years he had charge of the Mission farm and boarding house. Five years later he came to this city and engaged in the drug business and continued in that line for fourteen years. He was also engaged in the lumber trade and followed this until he retired from active business in 1884. He was state senator in 1882-84 and in 1880 was a delegate to the national Democratic convention. He was at one time president of the Bank of Oconomowoc.

Mrs. Ackley, who survives her husband, was Miss Josephine Breck, daughter of Samuel Breck and a niece of the Rev. James Lloyd Breck, one of the founders of Nashotah House. The children are: Mrs. James McBride of Pasadena, Cal.; Mrs. Breck, wife of the Rev. Muhlenburg Breck of Portland, Ore.; Dr. S. B. Ackley of Waukesha; Miss Gabriella Ackley of Chicago and Miss Elizabeth at home. The funeral, which is to be private, will be held at the residence at one o'clock Saturday with interment at Nashotah Mission cemetery. Rev. John White, rector of Zion Episcopal church, will officiate.
