STATE BIRD QUILT

St. Theresa's: Food, Fun, & Fund Raisers

By the early 1900s, St. Theresa's Parish was a thriving community of Catholics who worshipped in Eagle, Wisconsin. Fund raisers such as Pie & Ice Cream Socials were held to help cover the costs of the growing congregation.

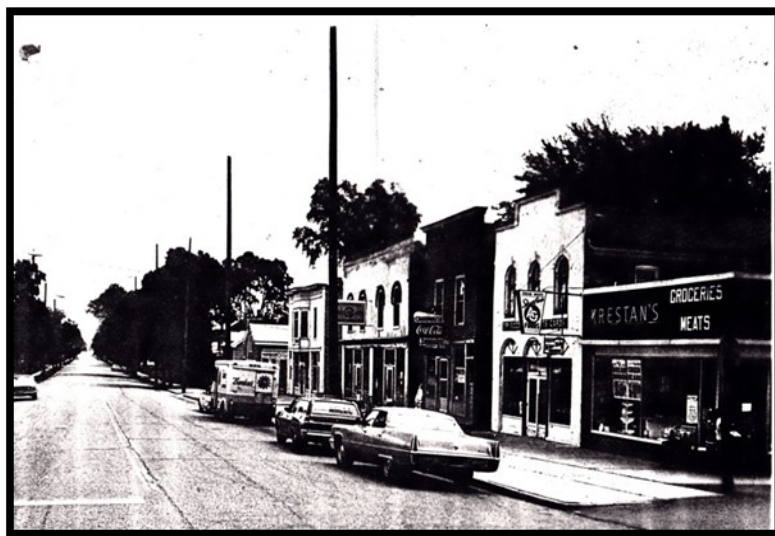

In the 1920s and early 1930s, Pie Socials were held in the center of town at the bandstand. Folks came to hear music and enjoy a slice of homemade pie with ice cream with their neighbors. We played games like BINGO and Chuck-a-Luck. Adults might even win a bottle of wine as a prize!

At some point, the Pie & Ice Cream Socials were served at Stead's Restaurant on Main Street in Eagle. Guests just had to cross the street to enjoy the fun and refreshments at the Band Stand.

I was a teenager in 1938. The pastor at St. Theresa's Catholic Church in Eagle was an energetic young priest named Fr. Carl Eschweiler. He led an active Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) that gathered in the church basement, attended Mass together once a month, and put on plays to raise money for their activities.

In 1947, Fr. Eschweiler and Theresa Steinhoff had a grand idea to offer the community a Beef Dinner. Parish members attended a meeting at Anna Schroeder's house. Theresa organized the volunteers and created committees to plan and carry out this mammoth task. Our church basement was enlarged and remodeled with a new kitchen, bathrooms, and two classrooms. Tony Weiler designed a kitchen with a stainless steel counter. Dinner was served downstairs; games and a beer tent were set up in the church yard. The crowds spilled outside before and after enjoying the feast.

Fr. Casimir Kuszewski (known affectionately as Fr. Casey) assumed leadership of St. Theresa in 1955. In 1957, Fr. Casey revived his predecessor, Fr. Budde's, idea of building a separate school consisting of four classrooms, a library, an office, and a basement suitable for a dining hall. The land where the school sits had been donated by the Lins family. Mr. Lins owned a luggage store in Milwaukee.

The idea of offering a second dinner in the new school basement was proposed. The third Sunday of July was reserved for the Beef Dinner, and the third Sunday of October would be the new Turkey Dinner. Don Burton had a large turkey farm on the south side of Eagle on Hwy. N. He was the supplier of all the gobblers we needed!

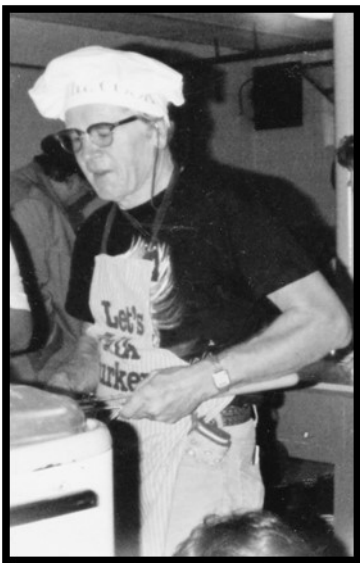
In 1959, our first Turkey Dinner was prepared and served in the new school hall. The largest crowd ever to attend, even to this day, was over

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2,000. Fr. Casey arranged for two busloads of devoted parishioners from his previous assignments in Milwaukee to enjoy our Turkey Dinner!

Finally, the volunteers had a commercial kitchen to prepare the delicious foods. Our menu consisted of turkey, mashed potatoes, carrots, green beans, coleslaw, squash, dressing, and homemade pie for dessert.

I can remember Roy Pieper and then Leonard Johnson cutting the cabbage with box graters. The Hubbard squash was dropped onto the cement floor to break into chunks, and was then peeled and baked. The dressing was made of day old bread that had been dried in parishioners' homes to make croutons.

HEALTH HINTS GLEANED IN THE COUNTY'S SCHOOLS.

CARE OF THE TEETH—III.

The dominant note of preceding articles on the teeth has been "Watch and care for your teeth." Nothing much has been said as to how this should be done, so a few words on the toilet of the mouth are timely.

Secure a good quality stiff brush with a tuft of bristles at the end; a dental cream free from pumice or grit, and with a delicious flavor to encourage regular use.

Very few people know how to get the best results from the tooth brush. Don't brush across the teeth, but start at the gums and bring the bristles down over the ends. On the lower teeth bring the brush from the gums upward. This method tends to throw the bristles between the teeth where most of the decay starts. If you are uncertain as to this method, your dentist or the county nurse will gladly show you how it is done.

You will get the greatest benefit from brushing the teeth just before retiring. This places the mouth in a wholesome state for the night, during which time the salivary glands are at rest and interfere less with fermentation. Try brushing your teeth thoroughly each night and see if your mouth does not feel better in the morning. So important is the cleaning at night that if you are to use the brush but once in twenty-four hours, let it be at night.

We do all the above to prevent the teeth from decaying, protect the stomach and bowels from toxins and by-products of fermentation, and to promote a sanitary condition of the mouth.

If there are some teeth that are decaying, a large percentage of this effort at cleanliness is wasted, so be sure to have this fault corrected by visiting your dentist regularly every few months. One dentist has rightly named these hollow teeth "garbage cans" and who would have a garbage can in his mouth? The dentist will fill up these garbage cans with clean, hard metal instead of fermenting food and will clean the tartar from the parts that have escaped your brush.

If the dentist is consulted in this way, you will enjoy clean, sound teeth, and know at the same time you are taking measures to preserve your general health.

People who are in the habit of having a dentist clean and examine the teeth every four or six months have the additional advantage of overcoming all the fear of a dentist's chair. They realize that "if we take pains with our teeth, pains will not take us."

EAGLE'S 4TH OF JULY CELEBRATION in 1905

The following article was found in the EHS archives and retyped due to fading print. Do you have special July 4th memories of Eagle's celebrations that you would like to share from your childhood or stories passed down from ancestors? We would love to hear them.

As usual, a large fund has been subscribed to celebrate the Fourth at Eagle with prayer, readings, songs, speaking and music. Games and races in the afternoon, fireworks and a social dance in the evening. At a meeting of citizens Francis Baker was made President, William Ihrig grand marshal; Frank W. Faestel, Jos. C. Von Rueden, John C. Wilton, Harry Hurst, aides; H. H. Earle, Chaplain; W. W. Perry, reader; Hon. E. Merton, speaker.

The Eagle choir of eight voices and Eagle cornet band of 17 pieces will provide music.

A marching parade will be one of the main features of the celebration and will consist of the usual comic, instructive, and interesting outfits. Forming on public square near Eagle Street, the march will be to Waukesha Street east, Sherman Street south, Jericho Street west to Clemons' grove where the usual exercises will take place.

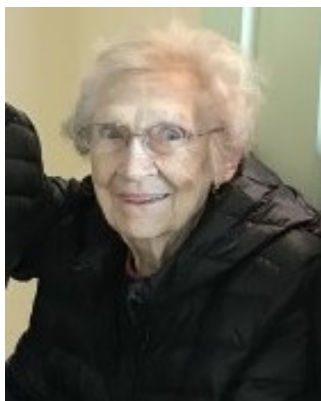
Mukwonago vs. Eagle base ball game at 2 p.m. Purse \$25.00.

Prizes for races are: Horse running race \$5, and \$2; trotting \$5 and \$2; vaulting \$2 and \$1; 100-yard foot race \$2.50 and \$1.25; 220-yard dash \$2.50 and \$1.25; high jump, broad jump, standing jump and various other sports for which liberal prizes are scheduled.

Prof. Edler of Chicago with his full orchestra will furnish music for the ball.

Teams will be permitted to be on the grounds during the day. No automobiles will be allowed in the parade or on the grounds. Everything will be arranged for the pleasure and comfort of the people and all are invited to come and help make it a day of cheer and good will.

Marty entered the service as a minor in 1945 with four friends using his skills as an artist to forge a notary

seal (carved backwards) on their applications which ultimately led to their entry in the service. Upon return from the war, he was a draftsman for Simmons Company. He went on to Layton School of Art, and later worked for Bert S. Gittens Agency & Eisenberg Studios before embarking on his own as a freelance artist. In addition to his freelance business he was asked, and became the art director for the Thorton-Reickert Agency. His love for wildlife art drew him to enter the prestigious Federal Duck Stamp contest that he won in 1977. He then won the 1979 WI Trout Stamp and the WI Duck Stamp Design contests. He also designed Wisconsin's first Great Lakes Salmon and Trout stamp and the first North American Endangered Species Conservation stamps in 1982. He has been Artist of the Year in several organizations including Ducks Unlimited. His works have been exhibited nationally in galleries and museums including the Smithsonian, Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum, and The Milwaukee Public Museum. He enjoyed painting in acrylics and sketching until his last days at Three Pillars in Dousman, WI. Marty's infectious smile, sense of humor, and passion for cooking will be deeply missed by all who knew him. Family and friends will gather for a celebration of Marty's life at a later date. 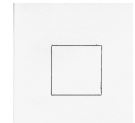
Thiele, Jeffery L.*Jun. 29, 1960-Jun. 17, 2020*

His superlative attitude, tireless attention to detail, and constant desire for excellence reflected great credit upon himself, his organization, and the Corps." He was also recognized for "distinguishing himself by outstanding performance

and dedication to duty as Weapons Company Logistics Representative..., where he was instrumental in the superior performance of the ALB. His dedication and underlying motivation were important examples of those he worked with. His noteworthy performance and 'Espirit de Corps' attitude were truly in keeping with the highest standards and traditions of the Corps." These recognitions were only discovered by his family after his passing. Jeff worked in a few different capacities over his lifetime, but the job he enjoyed most was that of training military detection dogs which he did following his military service.
