We have acquired a copy of the Wisconsin Historical Society book, <u>Index to Waukesha County</u>, <u>Wisconsin Marriages</u>, 1846 to 1907, which contains information taken from the records in the county courthouse. Included are date, name/birthplace of bride and name/birthplace of groom, and father's name and mother's maiden name of both the bride and groom. The book is divided into 2 sections: one arranged alphabetically by surname of the groom and the other by surname of the bride. This valuable historical/genealogical tool is available for your use on the second floor.

Michael J. Sasso June 11, 1925-February 3, 2004

Michael J. Sasso, 78, died Tuesday at Kindred Hospital in Greenfield. He was born June 11, 1925, to Louis and Frances (Novilla) Sasso. A lifelong resident of Eagle, he had operated Sasso's Kettle Moraine Inn and was a veteran of the Navy. A member of St. Theresa's Catholic Church in Eagle, he served on the Eagle Fire Department (he was fire chief for 10 years), Eagle American Legion Post 535, Eagle Village board (he was the water commissioner), and the Palmyra State Bank board.

He is survived by his wife, Rosann; they were married in St. Theresa's Catholic Church on August 18, 1992.

He is further survived by his daughters Sandra (John) Fugarino of Sussex and Shari of Eagle; his step-children Mark (Sally) Searing of Waukesha-and Lynne (Scott) Teal of La Crosse; and grand-children Alex and Lauren.

He was preceded in death by his first wife, Iris, and his sister Mary Crosswaite.

Mass of Christian Burial was held on February 6, 2004 at St. Theresa's. The Rev. Dennis Ackert officiated. Burial was in St. Theresa's Cemetery with military honors.

Vivian I. Wagner May 10, 1926-February 22, 2004

Vivian I. Wagner of Eagle, formerly of Mikana and West Allis, died at home on Sunday, February 22 at the age of 77. She was a member of St. John's Ev. Lutheran Church in North Prairie. She was born in Mikana on May 10, 1926, the daughter of Henry and Martha (nee Ewen) Ertel. A 1947 graduate of the Miwaukee Co. School of Nursing, she married Harold S. Wagner on November 5, 1949, in West Allis. In 1987 she retired as a nursing supervisor at Milwaukee Co. General Hospital. She was president of the Mukwonago Senior Citizens and a member of the East Troy Senior Citizens.

Survivors include her husband, Harold; three children—Craig (Christie) of Mukwonago, Bruce (Roberta) of Middleburg, Fla. and Karen (Timothy) Sperstad of Mukwonago; her grand-children Paul (fiancee Amy Melstrand) and Michael Welden, Erik, Spencer, Ian and Tracy Wagner and Ben and Tom Sperstad; brother Dr. Kenneth (Dr. Madge) Ertel of Amherst, MA; sister Alice (Dr. Demosthenes) Pappagianis; other relatives and friends.

Her parents, brother Wainwright Ertel and two sisters, Helen Carter and Gladys Kulwin preceded her in death.

Oral History— Mike Sasso

The Sasso family moved to Eagle in March of 1925, to Mrs. Lyons' house out on Elkhorn Road. "My parents came to Touhy's Resort on Eagle Lake in 1925 and found that this tavern [the Diamond Hotel] was for sale. I have no idea how he got interested in the tavern business, he was working for International Harvester at the time. "Mike grew up in the tavern, with the business on the first floor and the residence on the second. There were no pool tables in the Blue Diamond; however, they did serve meals and hold dances. "I have menus from that tavern where they used to serve roast beef, hamburgers, everything for 10 cents a sandwich."

"When the Blue Diamond tavern burned on March 5, 1931, my dad ran the St. Paul Inn while he was having the tavern rebuilt." The rebuilding was completed about four years later and the new structure was named the Pall Mall. Full meals were served starting in 1932—chicken, t-bone steaks and hamburger steak. On Saturday night they had band music. The music played was like the music played on radio station WLS—country-western. Dances were different from those held at the Masonic Hall. In 1936 the business was renamed Sasso's. When his father passed away in 1942, Mike was already part of the tavern business. He stated that "It was all I knew, so I had to stick with it."

In 1956 the business became known as Sasso's Kettle Moraine Inn. A different type of customer frequented the Inn. The trade became more transient, consisting of vacationers, snowmobilers and the like. Previously most of the customers were local people and farmers. But even after the changes, the number one seller was still beer.

The motel was built in 1978. Mike was building his mother a house and the basement got too big, so he put in four motel rooms. "Everybody in Eagle thought I was nuts, but we are completely filled all the time—hikers, campers, salesmen and construction workers. A lot of horse people, too."

When asked if there were ever any big-name people who came to the Inn, Mike answered, "Yes, Stan Musial, Robin Roberts and Red Schoendienst—the Milwaukee Braves. They came out to Eagle to get away and to hunt and fish. I met them through Bob Rush, a pitcher for the Chicago Cubs who later came to Milwaukee. Bob Rush was a roommate of mine in Davenport, lowa when I tried out for the Chicago Cubs right after the war. He made it, I didn't."

Mike remembered that his mother always made homemade spaghetti for the Milwaukee Braves. She would put on rolled steak and chicken cacciatore. His mother passed away in 1981 but Mabel Finney, who has been with them for 40 years, has all of Mrs. Sasso's recipes, so the menu served to customers now is nearly the same as then. Only the prices have changed.

When asked about what he saw in the future for Eagle, Mike did some comparing. He said, "Eagle had 4 gas stations and about 40 cars. Now it has 3 with about 1000 cars. It had 3 grocery stores and 2 barbershops. The only thing that has stayed the same is the 3 taverns. Modern transportation puts the small man out of business." He feels that the restaurant trade will not be lost, as people still have to eat. He noted that they have expanded the Inn. Mike Sasso sold the business in 1991.

Eulogy for Michael Sasso By Bob Batzler

Michael J. Sasso, 78 years of age, longtime member of the Eagle Fire Department, chief of department, American Legion Post 535, village board, water commissioner, Navy veteran, proprietor of the Kettle Moraine Inn, and many other things. These are well-known facts about him. He was referred to as "Mr. Eagle."

Today I want to talk about my friend Mike. I got to know him about 35 years ago when my wife and I and our kids moved here. Having been known to warm a stool in the watering holes of the community, I soon

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became good friends with Mike, the saloon keeper. (He didn't like to be called a tavern owner.)

He enjoyed woodworking, once building a beautiful cabinet with cove moulding around the top that would have thrilled a professional. He loved to go out to dinner and enjoy his favorite meal (a good steak) but he also like to stop at some small joint for a "sammitch." He liked music and would sometimes grab the microphone near the dumbwaiter that was used to call patrons when their food was ready and belt out his version of Sinatra's "New York, New York,"

Mike loved baseball. He played for Eagle's team in the old Land-O'-Lakes league. His favorite player was Joe DiMaggio—I think there was an Italian connection there. He was a fan of both the Braves and the Brewers. Behind his bar was a book of signatures of many players of these teams. He was especially proud of Stan Musial, Red Schoendienst, Henry Aaron and Eddie Mathews. That book was referred to as the signatures of his friends and guests, and not an autograph book.


Mike always said, "If you make a friend in Eagle, that person is a friend for life." He also felt you should help others as much as you can.

He also had a good sense of humor and was quite the practical joker. As the water commissioner he was instrumental in putting the "smiley face" on the water tower; not everyone in the community appreciated that. In the fall of its first year he had a scarf wrapped around the tower to keep it warm. The next year there were going to be earmuffs placed on the tower, but Mike nixxed that job, saying it was too dangerous.

Mike loved to play cards. Right now he is probably in that saloon in heaven behind the bar with his elbow on the bar rail and the cards are being shuffled for a game of euchre with his buddies Tex Tabat, Poncho Houk, Harvey Wambold and Squirt Nelson.

My wife, Joanne, came home from church last Saturday night and told me about the sermon that Fr. Dennis had used. He told of the minister who was going to throw all of the wine into the river, and then throw all of the whiskey into the river, and finally throw all of the beer into the river. Well, if Mike had been at that service, he would have jumped up and led in the singing of "Let's All Gather at the River."

Mike, may you rest in peace. All of your friends will long remember you, especially this friend.

Built in the mid-1800s, this structure at the intersection of Highways 67 and 59 has been remodeled and has had many names over the years. The Wisconsin Historical Society lists it as Kline's Hotel. In 1876, after the discovery of the Eagle diamond, its name was changed to the Diamond Hotel. Since 2002 Tracie Berndt has operated it under the name Stumble Inn. To many it will always be "Sasso's."
