HISTORICAL RESEARCH

Harold Chapman

Harold Chapman was born in the Town of Troy, Walworth County, November 18, 1897.

His first job was working as a bookkeeper for Smart Auto Company located where the Amoco Station is located now.

In 1918 he was drafted into the army.

In 1919 he married Ruby Rockteacher. Her father Fred Rockteacher, built their home located next to the gas station.

They would attend dances in Eagle hall. Some of the dances of the time were waltzes, circle two steps, and square dances. They have three girls.

There was a big mill in Eagle and barley was shipped in from the Dakota's. Barley was polished and sent to the breweries in Milwaukee. Eagle had coal sheds and a stockyard. The buyers would purchase the cattle and hogs and put them in the yards. Once a week they were shipped to Milwaukee.

These are some of the things that Harold remembers about the early days of Eagle.

1939 VILLAGE ELECTION

The following newspaper article was copied from Jean Bowey's scrapbook. It appeared in a 1939 Eagle Quill Newspaper.

Village Election

Village and Judicial election held at the Opera Hall April 4, 1939. Election officers sworn in by the Village Clerk. Polls opened at 9:00 A. M. and closed at 5:30 P. M.

The whole number of votes cast for President were 204 of which H. M. Loibl received 131.

The whole number of votes cast for Trustee, 2 year term, were 555 of which A. A. Belling received 165, Matel Watrous 157, and Richard Williams 155.

The whole number of votes cast for Trustee one year term to fill vacancy, were 201 of which Mary Stortell received 76 being a majority of votes among 3 candidates.

The whole number of votes cast for Clerk were 203 of which John B. Skidmbre received 121.

The whole number of votes cast for Treasurer were 203 of which Frank J. Agathen received 140.

The whole number of votes cast for Constable were 16 of which Everett Amann received 13.

The whole number of votes cast for Justice of Peace were 133 of which John H. Aplin received 133.

The whole number of votes cast for Supervisor were 209 of which Millard B. Markham received 109.

During the concert our Society will be offering ice cream sundaes, pie and cake for a donation.

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The Traveling Exhibit and Sequi Scroll will be part of this program.

More programs will be offered this year and will be highlighted in future newsletters. The public is encouraged to attend these events, so share this information with your friends and family.

Society members are asked to join this committee and help with one or all of the programs. This committee usually meets on Wednesday afternoons prior to the program to organize it and once after the program to evaluate it.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - Our objective this year is to pursue avenues of membership increase and inform everyone that Eagle has a Historical Society. We will set up a prospective member table at each Society program and event. Meetings will be held as needed. The chairperson will give a report at the monthly board meetings.

Which brings me to our next event. On March 19th, 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. we will have a <u>Bake Sale</u> at the Eagle Municipal Building. Come and vote, then take home some donuts for breakfast, bread for lunch or a pie for dinner.

In May we will hold our annual White Elephant/Bake Sale. The set up time will be May 9th all day and the sale will be May 10th from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and May 11th from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

This Committee plans fundraisers and events for the year. Each event has its own chair and recruits volunteers from the membership to aid when necessary. The Committee gets Board approval for events and a budget and fundraising goal for the year. Reports are presented to the Board, ongoing and final, for each event. This Committee meets when necessary, to facilitate the event.

HOSPITALITY COMMITTEE - works with program and events committees in order to provide refreshments, etc. We recruit

volunteers from the membership as needed. If you enjoy baking, this is your committee. Also telephone calling is involved, so this is the perfect spot for someone who wants to help from their own home, during their own schedule.

NEWSLETTER COMMITTEE - all members participate in this effort. We will mail issues in February, May and October. Any member can write an article to be presented for publishing. All committee chairpeople will inform us of upcoming celebrations and report on the progress of completed projects. curator and President will have some space to inform you of the overall operation the Society. So, write down something you remember about Eagle and the good-old-days and share it with us. Also, stuffing and addressing envelopes is another "at home job.
