# THE BOVEE FAMILY STORY (Part 2)

Editor's Note: Since the publication of Part 1 of this story in October of 2022, additional information and photos have surfaced. Please bear with us as we continue but first retrace a few steps in history.

As you may recall, second-generation farmer Benedict (1822-1875) had three sons: Matt, Marvin W. (1859-1947), and Frank. He ran the farm for awhile, but when he decided to try the oil boom out East his son Matt ran it in his absence. Benedict became ill, returned to Eagle and died a short time later. When Matt went to Kansas to run a bowling alley and saloon in the mid 1870s, Marvin W. took over until my grandpa, James F., (1895-1992) bought the farm from him in the 1940s. Matt returned to Eagle and ran a hotel, restaurant, and saloon in the old Railroad House. He later moved to the Veterans Home in Milwaukee due to increasing complications stemming from injuries suffered while serving in the Civil War and died in 1905.

I was fortunate to have spent a lot of time with Grandpa, known as "Stub" to family and friends, and listen to him talk about the old days. There were three grocery stores (Mayhew's, Sherman's, and Partridge's) serving about 250 families. Born and raised on the family farm, he and his siblings regularly heard the stamping of hooves and horsedrawn carriages on the road from the front of the house. Growing up, Grandpa did a lot of fishing with Jesse Sprague on Eagle Spring Lake during the day and coon hunting at night. The skinned hides sold for \$2-\$3 each.

The barn in the 1910s when grains were cut by grain binders, stacked into shocks to dry in the fields, and later taken to the threshing machine to be processed.

The original barn had two stories. When he was 13, a barn raising bee gathered to lay a foundation, move the barn from near the road to its current location, and construct an addition on the north making it into one story. Because farm equipment was expensive, threshing bees would form at harvest time where James F. & unidentified family and friends gathered to pitch in to help farmers out and then move on to the next farm to lend their hands and equipment. During the winter after all the crops were brought in, Grandpa would join other neighbors to harvest ice on Eagle Spring Lake.

While Grandpa was a fourth-generation farmer at heart, his brother Ben could not stay on the farm. He was an innovator with a natural curiosity to build and test things in the part of the farmhouse he had converted into a lab. Tinkering with kilns in his Bovee at their retirefriend's mother's garage led to an eventual partnership with Rod ment home on Main Street in the 1040s Harper and the establishment of the Harper Furnace Company. He also became an engineer and served as dean of MSOE.

Before the age of radio, the Robert Morris Masonic Lodge played an important part in the lives of my family, and most men belonged to it. Grandpa was an active member for 71 years and became a grand mason. Dances were held at the lodge, and people even rode in on their horses from Troy and Troy Center to attend them. They would leave their horses behind either the Methodist or Catholic Church and then ride back after the dance. It was where he met his future wife Fern, who was born in Dayton, WI, but Grandpa didn't ride in on a horse; he drove his Model T Ford. They also enjoyed seeing movies shown at the Hall. Grandpa and Grandma were married in 1922 and had two children, Dorothy and James M. (1931-2015), my dad, a/k/a "Marty".

At one point, they raised animals as well as crops: Guernseys, beef cattle, some sheep, and over 100 Yorkshire pigs. There was a Jericho milk plant and blacksmith shop (in the stone building still standing near the NE corner of Hwys. E and NN). Grandpa had portable milking machines and hauled his milk to a transfer station in Eagle in cans until tank trucks took over the process. Grandpa let the Eagle Rod and Gun Club use his land to put up buildings east of the barn to raise pheasants that were later released for hunting. One large building was screened in and covered with tin on the bottom to keep foxes out.

In keeping with family tradition, Grandpa fulfilled his civic duty by serving for 40 years on the Eagle Town Board as supervisor, then chairman as well as the Waukesha County Board. He also served on the District 4 Eagleville School Board. Grandma was one of the first women in the community who was allowed to vote and was an active member of the La Belle Chapter Order of the Eastern Star in Mukwonago. She also worked at the munition plant in Palmyra during WWII.

In addition to doing farm chores, as a teenager my dad mowed the Eagle Spring Golf Course with a Ford tractor. He would later serve the US Army in the artillery about five miles from the front during the Korean War. While my dad was in service, Grandpa put up a silo, milkhouse and machine shed. Dad met my mom, Marlene Janke of Milwaukee, at The Old Mill owned by Cy and Lillian LeVeille, which later became Kroll's Resort. Mom was a city girl but came to love Eagle, as did her family which eventually followed her out here. Dad worked at Wisconsin Electric and RTE in Waukesha as a welder.

Grandma took care of the garden, chickens, ducks, geese, a brooder house and sold eggs. She also made sure there was food on the table. My brother and I remember helping with her very productive garden. She grew radishes, cucumbers, carrots, green beans, onions, beets, and raspberries and had an apple orchard down "back at the lane", as Grandma referred to it. They canned a lot of the produce and also made pickles. Grandma usually wore a straw hat while outdoors and after spotting one of us would often say, "Hey you, come here and pull some weeds!" Seemed like there were always weeds to pull. Some things don't change.

In the 1960s, most of the noises heard on the road came from tractors and other agricultural vehicles. A passing car would make our heads turn. Convoys of Army trucks would also come from the east to do training exercises in the Kettle Moraine Southern Unit, where Old World Wisconsin is located. The DNR bought a lot of land from farmers in the 1960s and '70s and auctioned off buildings from former farms. In 1966, Dad bought a building at one of these auctions and recycled the lumber to put a north addition and lean-to onto the barn.

My brother Steve and I were recruited to help with that. Subdivisions sprung up replacing the many pastures of grazing Guernseys and fields of wheat familiar to previous generations, and the population grew. We heard sadness in Grandpa's voice when he spoke about these changes. Farming for my grandparents, except for hay, ceased in the 1970s due to a bad drought. Land was leased out to local farmers to grow crops. Tom Day, a neighbor, commented to me recently, "Your Dad had the best hay in the area for my horse; I really missed it when he stopped selling it—and the price was right."

As I was flipping through a magazine many years ago now, I saw a photo that caught my attention. My eyes were drawn not so much to the motorcycle or even the people on it but to the buildings and trees in the background that seemed oddly familiar to me. After bringing this up to Grandpa, he confirmed that my hunch was correct as he had given permission to use our farm for this publicity photo taken during a Harley Davidson convention held at the golf course around the early 1950s.

Since I purchased the family homestead from my grandparents in 1989, I've done quite a bit of updating. A major remodeling of the house was completed just nine days before my wedding day (I guess I cut it a little

close), and my wife Lesley and I enjoyed 21 happy years of marriage in it until her passing four years ago. Growing up in the Town of Eagle, I did a lot of the same things kids did in small towns, but it wasn't until recently as I dug deeper to fill spaces on my family tree that I realized just how deep those roots grew and branches spread. Some of the many burr oak trees that grace the yard (and we used to climb) are over 200 years old so were here even before my family arrived; Grandpa said there used to be even more. The traffic sounds that make my head turn now are those of the occasional tractor or, even rarer, the lone horseback rider. While I continue to manage what was once known as Bovee's Burr Oaks

Farm with a lot of help from my brother Steve (especially when I need mechanical expertise) and reflect on the many lives which helped develop Eagle, I am proud to know what important roles (teacher, merchant, farmer, postmaster, politician) my ancestors have played in that process. I am thankful for opportunities to help out on the family farm, that I paid attention when my ancestors shared history, and for being granted the time to now put pen to paper and record information passed down orally, through family photos, records, and (not the least of which) by good old-fashioned legwork while visiting their final resting places. I've learned through this exercise that the longer I search, the more information I discover to explore.

Don was born on July 27, 1938 in Milwaukee, WI, the son of Victor and Emilie (Kadau) Sierpinski. He grew up in the Milwaukee area, and after his schooling he served his country in the US Army. He was united in marriage to Rose Krohn on June 11, 1966, at St. Thomas Church in Milwaukee. Don and Rose were blessed with three loving daughters, Heidi, Dawn and Gretchen. Don was locally famous for sharing his tomato harvest with his friends and neighbors, and he gifted countless tomatoes to many people over the years. He was also an active member of St. Matthew Lutheran Church of Palmyra where he served as the custodian for a good number of years. One of Don's ministries at church was to collect and turn in aluminum cans and then donate the proceeds to the church—a task he enjoyed and was dedicated to. Don was a kind and friendly man. He will be dearly missed by those he leaves behind.

He is survived by his three daughters: Heidi (Ted) Graser of Burlington, WI, Dawn Jones and Gretchen (John) Weber of Waukesha, WI; and his six grandchildren: Daniel Jones; T.J., Ben and Rachel Graser; and James and Sam Weber. 
