CHILDREN KEPT TOO LONG IN

THERE SHOULD BE DETENTION HOME, SAYS MISS YERXA, OFFICIAL

"Children in charge of the state are kept too long in our institutions," said Miss Elizabeth Yerxa, of the juvenile department of the state board of control, to an audience of members and friends of the Municipal League at the recent, meeting at the Y W. rooms.

"Our institutions should only be continued Miss | day morning. detention homes," Yerxa, "since every child should be placed in a home of its own as promptly as possible. Of the 3,500 629 have been in an institution less than one year, 460 between one and two years, 901 between two and six years, 205 between six and ten years and 64 over ten years. Something is wrong in Wisconsin which makes this possible.'

Few Orphans There

Miss Yerxa stated that the institutions of this state are not orphanages, mince of all the 3,500 children in them only 241 are orphans. Homes broken up by divorce are responsible for 342 of them. Children having one parent living are 833. The mother's pension law in the state is not well administered, she stated. We have in this state according to Miss Yerxa's figures 34 child institutions not including schools for the deaf and blind. She said some of the managers of these institutions appeared to care more about keeping the rooms clean than about keeping the children happy in play. Food was not always what it should be. In one institution no butter, but oleomargarine instead, and skim milk were served. She thought the superintendents of these institutions should try to find out the special tastes and gifts of the children under their care and gratify them as far as possible. A Milwaukee institution has a little girl with what appears like a fine voice. Miss of that city would be willing to give made in that direction.

She expressed the opinion that every child placed in an institution should have a thorough physical examination made upon entering and that needed corrective work should be carried on in the institution. Few do this adequately, she said

She said that 8,000 illegitimate children, are born in Wisconsin each year and that Waukesha county has its share of these unfortunates. She declared that both these mothers and children need special attention.

Home-finding societies need careful supervision, she stated. Some are worthy institutions and some are
