PROMINENT W. C. T. U. WORKER DIES

PEWAUKEE—Mrs. August Zunker has been advised of the death of her aunt, Mrs. Jackson Silbaugh, who passed away in Seattle, Washington, at the age of 55. Mrs. Silbaugh was a national lecturer for the W. C. T. U. and first woman to go to the Washington legislature as an official lobbyist and never missed a session in the past 17 years. She graduated from the Wisconsin University in 1894 with special honors in rhetoric and oratory and in 1924 was admitted to practise law before the department of the interior.
