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FRANK O. LOWDEN DECLARES THERE IS PROBLEM OF GRAVE IMPORT TO BE MET

By WILLARD R. SMITH

(United Press Staff Correspondent) Frank O. Lowden, farmer industrialist, former governor of Illinois, and possible candidate for president of the United States, at the invitation of the Wisconsin legislature today outlined to that body his ideas on needed agricultural relief.

"I am not insisting upon any particular remedy," he said after explaining his conception of ail through federal farm board. "I only say that there is a farm problem of the gravest importance, and that a solution must be found if we would pre serve our civilization.

The discussion over the farm situation has reached a new stage Lowden asserted, where "it is being seen that it is not only the farmer who is involved. The business world is now viewing the problem as one in which business too is vitally interested. From every angle the great agricultural problem ceases to be an agri cultural problem merely and becomes a problem of truly national scope."

"What the farmer asks is that he be given the same right to name a price in the first instance and that he be enabled to acquire an organization which will secure to him the same power to maintain that price which other industries through their superior organization now enjoy."

Due to Conditions

"Depopulation of the farm, running down of the farm plant, and exhaustion of the soil are the results of present unprofitable agricultural conditions according to economists," he said, "and they will, if continued, cause prices to go unreasonably high, entailing great distress in con suming centers."

Stalwart republicans who first moved to block the invitation on the grounds that it was the launching of a "Lowden-for-president" boom by the La Follette progressive forces found surprisingly little political

"If the board finds that all of these co-operative to take control of the surplus," he explained. The only aid from the government which the cooperative would require would be that the government should distribute among all the producers of the particular commodity the' cost to the co-operative of handling the surplus. "The bulk of the product would move without interference in its nor-


