The average of production for the five animals was 87 pounds of butter and 19,383 pounds of milk on yearly test, and 27.52 pounds of butter and 542.2 pounds of milk per week.

"The result of the exhibit in the importance to Waukesha county as a market center, for in this class the value of a sire is proved conclusiveber of daughters.

"Sensational individuals do not count for so much in practical dairying," he continued, "and I have never been very enthusiastic about them. They are all right for advertising purposes, but when it comes to practical dairying by the man who makes with the legal officials named and his living that way, the uniformly big producing individuals in a herd

"The real aim for excellence dairy cattle is toward averages. That is what produces the volume of milk. An extraordinary sire may father a handsome daughter or two and a number of non-productive ones, and the average be below some normal grade cattle. It is the sire whose whole family on the female side maintains volume of production which is the most valuable in the long run.

Twenty Daughters Test Highly "We have on our farm twenty daughters of Terrace Lawn, all of which have been tested for production and which show 261/2 pounds of butter a week and over 19,000 pounds of milk a year, average. All the daughters who were shown at St. Paul were 'in the money.'

"Our herd had another first award, that being in the producing cow class.
