Stir in Londan. (Special Cable Dispatch to the Chica-

go Record-Herald.) LONDON, March 23.—The announcement that Schalk-Burger, who is acting president of the Transvaal; Reitz and other Boer leaders have arrived at Petoria under a flag of truce, reached London this evening. It caused a big stir at the hotels and the clubs.

There was but one opinion expressed—that the chances for a quick end of the war are most favorable. In military clubs it was immediately assumed that the fact that Schalk-Burger has come into the British lines under a flag of truce and has gone south into the Orange River Colony can be recruised mean but one thing, and that is that the negotiations are on the subject of the recruised means and the recruised means are considered. possible peace.

Go to Seek Kitchner.

NEW BATTLE SHIP FOR CZAR.

Retzivan, Just Finished at Cramp's, Will Sail for Cronstadt Soon.

PHILADELPHIA, March 23.-The big battle ship Retizivan, which has just been completed for the Russian government at Cramp's shipyards, was officially added to the czar's navy Sunday and the regular routine of a man-of-war began on the ship. The ceremony was simple, and was conducted by Father Ratskowfsky, the ship's chaplain. The crew of 700 men and officers were lined up on the main deck with bared heads as the services of the Greek church were read, after which at a signal from Captain Stchen-snovitch, the Retzivan's commander, the blue cross of St. Andrew was hoisted at the stern. Soon after the ceremony had been concluded the battle ship was hauled into midstream by four tugs and will sail for Cronstadt about April 12.
