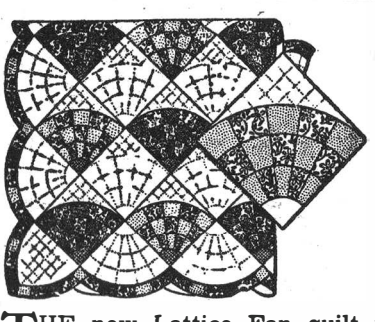

Local Recipes

By special request we are printing Mrs. Ethel Morrison Marsden's "Victory Cake" which was one of the popular recipes demonstrated at the cooking school last week.

VICTORY CAKE

- ½ cup shortening
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
½ tsp. cloves
1 cup sugar
½ tsp. soda
2 tsp. baking powder
2 cups flour
1 cup condensed tomato soup
½ cup chopped walnuts
1 cup seedless raisins
¼ tsp. salt
Cream shortening with the spices and salt and add sugar slowly. Sift flour, soda and baking powder and add slowly, alternating with the soup. Stir in raisins and nuts. Turn into a small loaf pan (8 x 4 x 3) and bake at 350 degrees F. for 50 minutes. If possible let stand several hours or overnight before cutting. Cover with Cream Cheese Icing or Brown Butter Icing.

CREAM CHEESE ICING

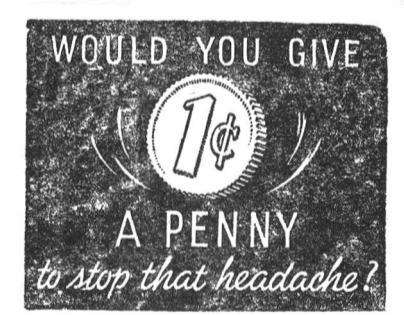
- 3 oz. cream cheese
1½ cups powdered sugar, sifted
1 tsp. vanilla
Cream all together and spread on above cake.

BROWN BUTTER ICING

- 6 tbsp. butter
1½ cups confectioners' sugar (sifted)
1 tsp. vanilla
4 tbsp. cream
Heat butter until golden brown, add sugar and vanilla. Add enough cream to make frosting soft enough to spread.

Carlin's Column
