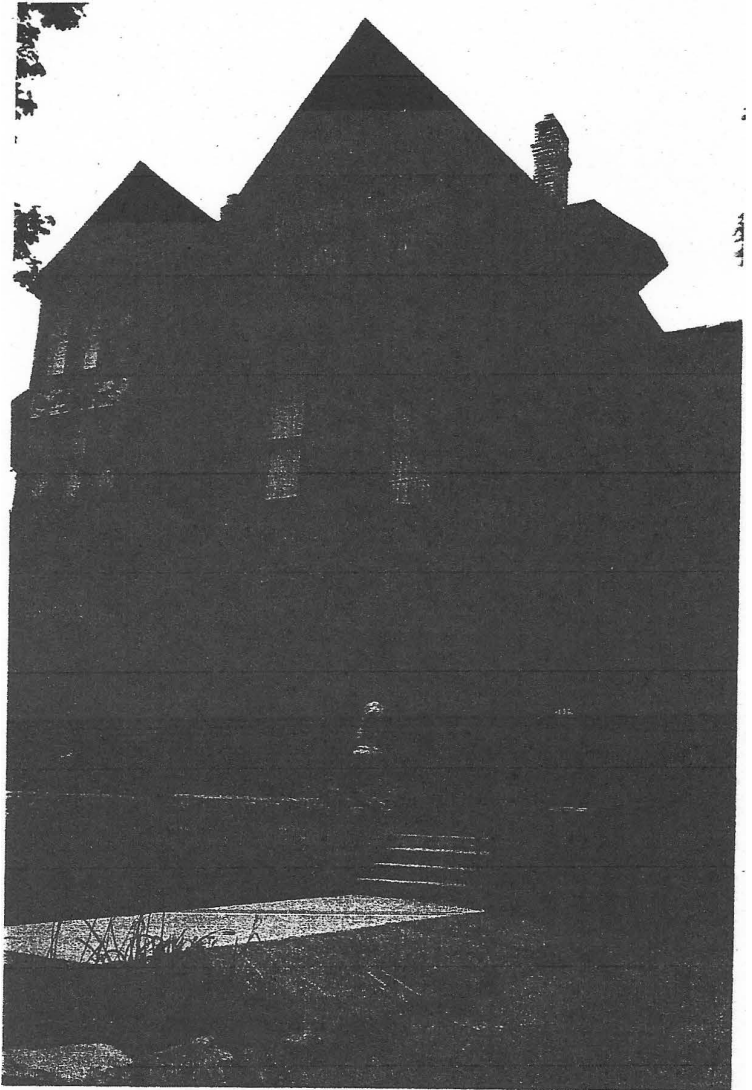


Appendix

Included in the appendix chapter are three photographs: The first photograph is of the “Eiring Mansion” on 2825 West Kilbourn Avenue in Milwaukee as it looks today.
