





Agnes Clarkson, The daughter of George and Rose Kutschenreuter enlisted in the U.S. Army Wacs in March 1944. After her basic training he worked as a physical therapist in Washington, Colorado, Texas and Washington D.C. In 1952 the group of Wacs from Texas were ordered to Osaha, Japan Juring the Korean War. Her son SGT George Liebl a paratrooper & langer green Beret met her in Japan where George received the urple Heart. After coming back to the States Agnes served in Germany and Paris France for Shape Headquarters. Her son was a recruter for U.S. Army. He was killed in a car accident n Waukesha Wis. on May30 1961 Agnes retired after 22 years in the service and died Jan 20, 1991 after a illness of parkinsons. One of Agnes favorite stories was about General Eisenhauer. The Wacs asked him if he would ever run for President. He said he never would do that. The Wacs all bet \$100.00 together that he wouldn't run. But of course he did and the Wacs lost their money.
