Yokohama Docking Sees Mothers, Sons Reunited

YOKOHAMA, Feb. 17—Two mothers, reversing usual procedure, were reunited yesterday at dockside with their soldier sons—in Yokohama.

One of the mothers is a soldier, M/Sgt. Agnes K. Clarkson of the 279th Army General Hospital at Osaka, who greeted her son, Sgt. George M. Liebl, 22, when he walked off the U.S.N.S. Gen. E. T. Collins at the 2d Transportation Major Port.

WAITING BESIDE her at dockside was Mrs. Dorothy Kane, whose son, Pvt. Ray L. Steele, 20, Long Beach, Cal., was one of the replacements aboard the huge troopship.

For Sgt. Clarkson and her son, both of Eagle, Wis., it was their first reunion in 29 months. Mrs. Kane, wife of CPO Robert W. Kane of the Military Sea Transport Service in Yokohama, had not seen her son in 14 months.

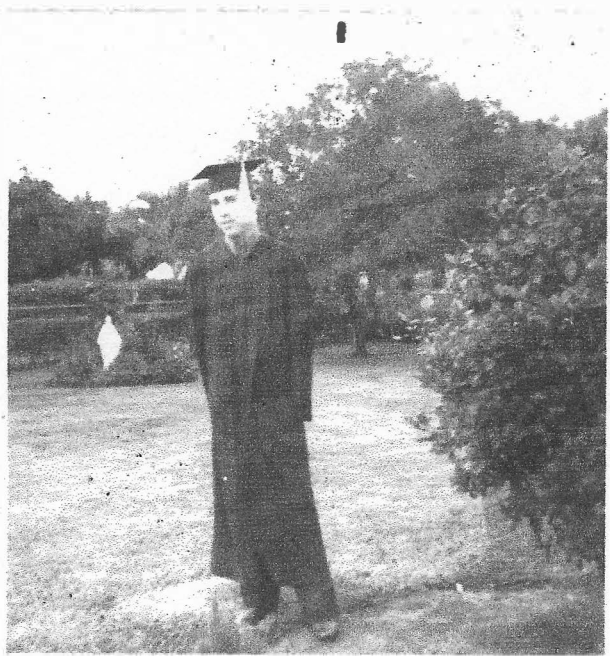

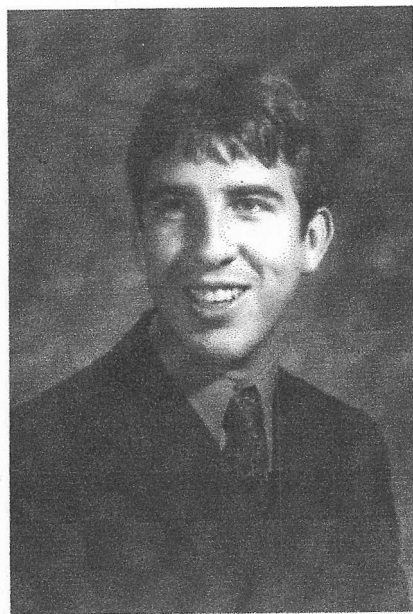

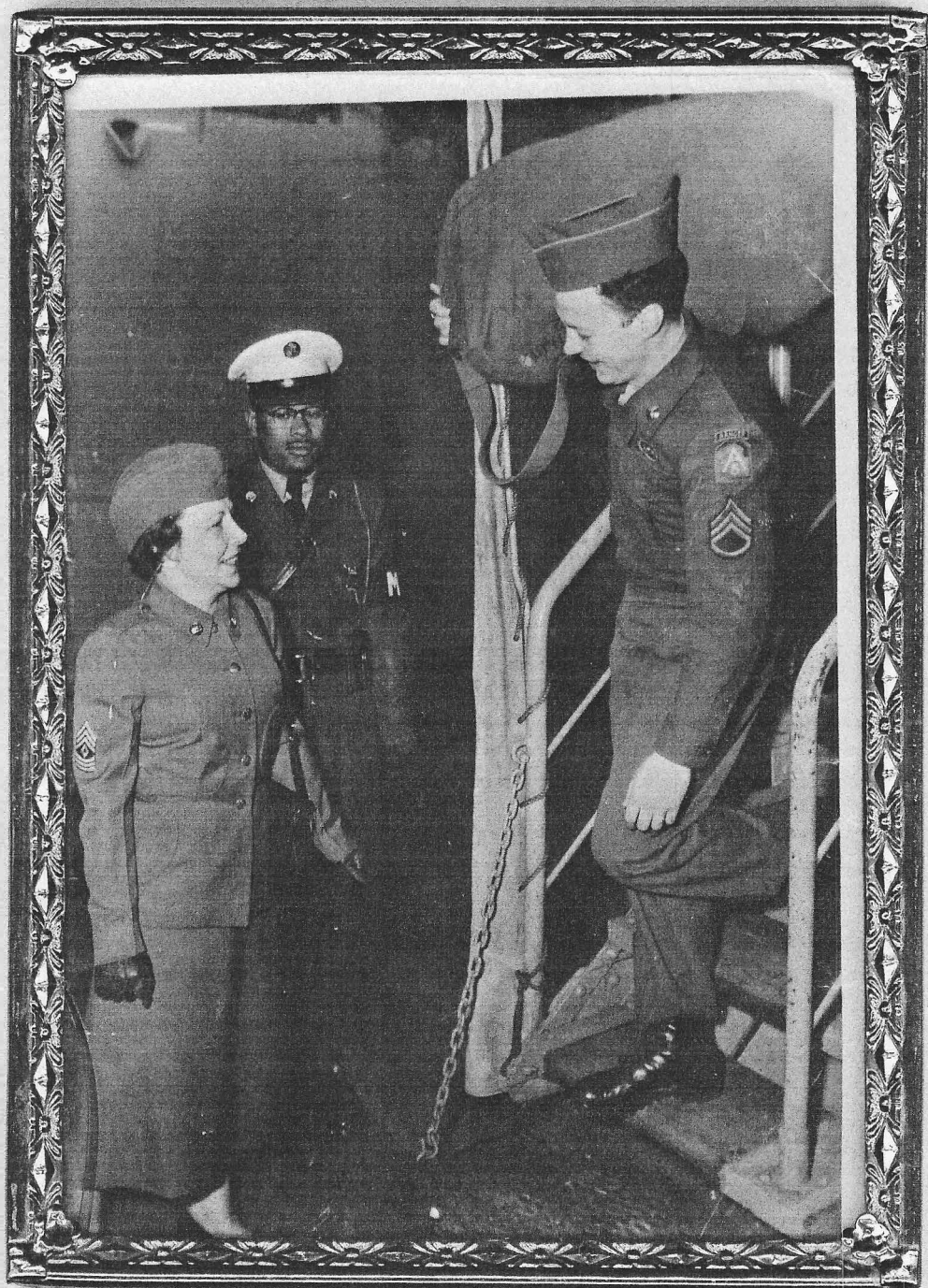

Agnes Clarkson, The daughter of George and Rose Kutschenreuter enlisted in the U.S. Army Wacs in March 1944. After her basic training she worked as a physical therapist in Washington, Colorado, Texas and Washington D.C,

In 1952 the group of Wacs from Texas were ordered to Osaha, Japan during the Korean War. Her son SGT George Liebl a paratrooper & Ranger green Beret met her in Japan where George received the Purple Heart.

After coming back to the States Agnes served in Germany and Paris France for Shape Headquarters.

Her son was a recruiter for U.S. Army . He was killed in a car accident in Waukesha Wis. on May30 1961

Agnes retired after 22 years in the service and died Jan 20, 1991 after a illness of parkinsons.

One of Agnes favorite stories was about General Eisenhower. The Wacs asked him if he would ever run for President. He said he never would do that. The Wacs all bet \$100.00 together that he wouldn't run. But of course he did and the Wacs lost their money.
