The Meaning of Thanksgiving.

I was walking through Walmart the other day, and as I walked past a Thanksgiving display I overheard a mother ask her young daughter, "Why did the Pilgrims celebrate the first Thanksgiving?" And the little girl answered, "They wanted to give thanks." "And who did the Pilgrims give thanks to?" the mother asked. And the daughter replied, "I don't know, I guess they were thanking the Indians, that's what my teacher said." I was shocked as the mother acknowledged the child's answer, but made no effort to explain the underlying reason for Thanksgiving. All around us we hear people sing "God Bless America," yet as we prepare to celebrate a major national holiday that has deep Christian roots, many of our friends, family and neighbors don't understand its significance or heritage. So I wanted to take a moment to share that meaning with you, and encourage you to do the same this Thanksgiving season.

The real Thanksgiving story started in 1621, at Plymouth Colony, Massachusetts. Life was hard for the Pilgrims as they settled in, during the first winter nearly everyone became sick and half of the citizens at the colony died before the winter ended. But spring and summer came, and the first harvest was plentiful. So Governor William Bradford called a special day of thanks, and with 100 Indian friends, they celebrated a weeklong feast giving thanks to God - the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, the God made known in Jesus Christ. Other thanksgiving days were also held in Virginia, Florida, Maine, and Texas, one colony even wrote into its charter that the day of their arrival was to be "kept holy as a day of thanksgiving to Almighty God." Later in American history George Washington announced a day of National Thanksgiving to God in 1789, and Abraham Lincoln declared that same Thanksgiving to be an annual holiday in 1863. But today we don't hear much about thanking our Almighty God any more, the holiday has been commercialized to the point where we are encouraged to give a generic gratefulness that isn't directed to anyone in particular.

But as Christian parents we need to make sure we are passing our religious heritage on to our children, and not relying on others to do what God has ordained us as parents to do. So this Thanksgiving, don't assume everyone knows why we gathered together over turkey and cranberry sauce. Make a point of reminding everyone that a generic gratefulness isn't enough; but explain that Thanksgiving means giving thanks to God, the one true God and being thankful for all that the Lord has provided.

May God bless you and may you be a blessing to someone!

BreakPoint with Charles Colson Commentary # 020104 – 01/04/2002 Walls of Our Own Making: The Founders and Religion

This term, the Supreme Court will hear and decide a case that will shape the relationship between church and state for years to come. The case involves Cleveland's school voucher program. Two courts have declared the program unconstitutional because, in their estimation, the program amounts to a "diversion of government aid to religious institutions," and an "endorsement of religious education."

The contemporary assumption in the courts and among legal scholars is that the Constitution requires what has been called a "high wall of separation" between church and state. If a program can, in any way, be characterized as constituting an entanglement between religion and government, it is said to be a violation of the First Amendment's establishment clause.

Well, there are two problems with this reigning orthodoxy. First, the phrase "wall of separation" doesn't appear in the Constitution or even in the proceedings of the Constitutional Convention.

Second, it's a total inversion of nearly all of the Founders' beliefs about the relationship between church and state. While they did not want the federal government to establish a national church, they viewed religion as indispensable to the American experiment.

In his marvelous new book, On Two Wings, author, theologian, and former U.S. ambassador Michael Novak reminds readers that a religion-free public square was the last thing the Founders wanted. They believed that religion, by which they meant biblical religion, is "necessary for the maintenance of republican institutions." Or as Jefferson put it, "no nation has ever yet existed or even been governed without religion. Nor can be."

Why? Because, in the Founders' estimation, virtue was the precondition for liberty. And as James Madison put it, belief in an all-powerful, wise, and good God was the source of virtue.

Thus, unlike many of our present-day elites, the Founders didn't see religion as a threat to liberty. On the contrary, it was irreligion or atheism that was the threat. These would cause "everyday morals" to "slide into decadence" and pave the way for tyranny.

Accordingly, the Founders saw religious belief and practices as something to be encouraged. In my home state of Massachusetts, John Adams argued that religious education is essential to survival of a free republic. His case was so persuasive that the state's constitution included a provision that required the state to pay for religious education if there weren't any private groups able to do it.

Against this historical backdrop, the concerns of contemporary courts seem like a radical departure from the Founders' intentions which, in fact, they are. But it's not because modern judges have discovered something the Founders didn't know about maintaining a free society. It's because their worldview causes them to see personal autonomy and freedom as synonymous -- an idea the Founders explicitly rejected.

In this worldview, biblical religion is the enemy of personal autonomy and, thus, the enemy of freedom. Hence, the relentless drive to rid our public life of religious content. Christians can help their neighbors to understand the true role that biblical faith plays in American life. That starts with understanding that the Founders, far from fearing religious education, saw it as somethin indis ensable to American life.

Applying Bible Principles

A few years ago, the world was thrown into confusion and chaos. The Middle East had oil, and the rest of the world wanted it. This was a crisis because we believed that we were running out of oil. In reality, we were not running out of oil. As Larry O'Nan described it, "The core problem was a matter of imbalance, greed, and selfishness. Competition had created an environment where we thought we needed to get something before someone else got it."

Just as perception created an illusion that the world was running out of oil, perception has created an illusion when it comes to giving to the work of the Lord and to His ministry at Eagle United Methodist Church. The perception is that our financial resources are insufficient to enable us to give. Some of us think that we simply cannot afford to give.

But that's not the situation at all. Even poverty (something which is probably not descriptive of anyone in our midst) is not a reason for not giving to the Lord. The Christians in Macedonia were very poor. As 2 Corinthians 8:2 describes them, they were "very poor." Yet, even in that situation, they were full of joy and gave as much as they were able and more. How could they do that?

The reason they gave abundantly, eagerly and willingly out of their extreme poverty was that "First they gave themselves to the Lord." That's the secret of giving that honors God. When we give ourselves to Him wholeheartedly and without reservation of any kind, then our financial resources will follow.

During the reign of Oliver Cromwell, the government ran out of silver with which to make coins. Cromwell sent his men everywhere to see if they could find more of the precious metal. They returned to report that the only silver they could find was in the statues of the saints which were on display in various cathedrals. "Good," replied Cromwell. "We will melt down the saints and put them into circulation."

As you consider the offering which will be received next Sunday at Eagle United Methodist Church, and as you consider the resources God has placed at your disposal, will you be "melted down" for His service and His glory? Like the Macedonian Christians, will you "regardless of your financial situation" first give yourself to the Lord and then allow your financial resources to follow?



Simple Salisbury Steak

1 Can Cream of Mushroom Soup, divided

1 Pound ground beef

1/3 cup dry bread crumbs

1/4 cup finely chopped onions

1 egg beaten

1 Tbs vegetable oil

11/2 cups sliced mushrooms

Fresh parsley and halved cherry tomatoes for garnish.

- 1. In large bowl, mis throughly ¼ cup of soup, the beef, bread crumbs, onion and egg. Shape frimly into 6 oval patties of even thickness.
- In 10 inch skillet over med-high heat, in hot oil, cook half of patties until brown on both sides. Remove; set aside. Repeat with remaining patties. Spoon off fat.
- 3. In same skillet, stir in remaining soup and mushrooms; return patties to skillet. Reduce heat to low. Cover; cook 20 minutes or until patties are thoroughly cooked and no longer pink, turning patties occasionally.
- 4. Serve patties with mushroom sauce spooned over. Garnish with parsley and cherry tomatoes.







BreakPoint with Charles Colson Commentary #011024 - 10/24/2001 Playing Hardball with Sin: Celluloid Worldview Lessons

It's not often that film graphically illustrates the utter impossibility and bankruptcy of a secular, self-centered worldview. It may not be what the makers of the new film HARDBALL intended, but that's what they've achieved.

HARDBALL is about a compulsive Chicago gambler named Conor O'Neill, played by Keanu Reeves. O'Neill has placed one too many bets he can't pay, and the local bookies are after him with baseball bats. O'Neill turns to a childhood friend --now an investment banker -- and begs him to bail him out. Instead, his friend offers him a deal: If O'Neill will coach an inner-city baseball team, he'll pay him \$500 a week.

O'Neill reluctantly agrees. He begins coaching a half-dozen kids who live in the infamous Cabrini-Green housing project. At first, O'Neill spends most of his time breaking up fights and trying to keep enough kids on the team to prevent them from being expelled from the league. But slowly, his efforts pay off -- and the team begins winning games.

Sadly, what could be an inspiring film ends up with tragedy; neither the coach nor the kids can overcome the consequences of bad decisions made many years in the past -- but this is what gives Christians a window for worldview witnessing.

In all too many movies, you see, the filmmaker subtly promotes a worldview contrary to Christianity – not only promotes it, but portrays it as workable. For instance, fornication is often depicted as a normal part of life. But how often does the filmmaker show the long-term cost of violating God's command to save sex for marriage? Hardly ever. Celluloid characters routinely violate God's laws with impunity – giving the impression that moviegoers can do the same.

But not in HARDBALL. In this film, the consequences of sin form a backdrop to every scene. We see what happens when people feed dangerous desires like gambling: These desires become compulsions that rule their lives. We see what happens when couples engage in sex outside of marriage: Their children live in poverty, danger, and despair. We see what happens when too many

kids grow up without fathers: They form gangs that prey on the innocent.

Christians often view popular culture as the enemy -- and with good reason: Much of it promotes and celebrates a licentious lifestyle. But the answer is not to hide films and music from our kids. Instead, we need to use them to help our kids think critically about the world.

Parents can use films like HARDBALL, if you choose to see it, as teaching aids to the truth -- to remind our kids that God's commands are for our good, and that the costs of violating them are both real and ugly.

HARDBALL is rated PG-13 for a good deal of foul language and some violence. I don't recommend it. But if your teens or their friends -- or your neighbors -- decide to view HARDBALL, use it as a chance to teach some worldview lessons. Once your kids understand that someone's worldview makes its way into every film, they'll learn to look for it themselves.

For better or for worse, movies are part of our culture. But if we have the proper tools, we can use them to be discerning to see the truth of a biblical worldview when it's portrayed, rarely though that is, and the false ideas generally promoted in secular culture.





Applying Bible Principles

God uses money in a variety of ways in the lives of His children. One of the most important ways God uses money is to confirm direction. Simply stated, God uses the supply of money or the lack of it to confirm His direction for many of the decisions we must make in life.

If God gives us clear direction which is confirmed by His Word, then He will provide whatever is needed to carry out that direction. The only problem is that He expects us to step out in faith in obedience to His leading and His Word, usually without knowing in full the pathway that lies ahead.

Living that kind of life requires faith in God's person and His promises. It requires taking God at His Word and basing how we live on His Word. It requires trusting Him, even when circumstances appear to be contrary. It requires seeking first His kingdom, and then being confident that He will provide what we need. It requires — as the writer of Hebrews observed — believing that God " . . . exists and rewards those who seek him."

Hudson Taylor, a missionary to China who lived in the 19th century, summed it up beautifully this way: "God's work, done in God's way, will never lack God's supply." This means that if we are not experiencing God's supply, either we are not doing God's work (that is, we are not seeking His kingdom first) or we are not doing God's work in His way.

Make no mistake about it: God is not a God of disorder. He will not provide specific direction which He confirms by his Word if He does not intend to provide what is necessary for us to obey Him fully. But He looks to us to be willing to trust Him by taking the first step, and then another, and yet another.

By the way, has God been speaking to you lately? Has He confirmed that direction through His Word? If so, remember this: You can be confident that as God works in your life, He will use money or the lack of it to confirm His direction.
