When this church was built, Eagle had a population of 275 people. This church was full and alive when there were not even cars to get to it. They rode horses, they walked...but they filled this church every Sunday.

I bought my house on Main street in Eagle in 1994 when I was 28 years old. Eagle had a population of just over 1000 people.

This church was alive, healthy, had a booth at Kettle Moraine days selling pies, held free lunches for the elderly, or pretty much anyone wanting to come and hang out and enjoy visiting.

I was raised Baptist in the south and was a member of the Point Pleasant Church of Christ in Hebron Kentucky from birth till we moved North. I was 14 at the time. My mom tried out several churches but never found one she liked. It is a shame she never tried this little church just down the road from where she lived, as she would have loved it. It is a Methodist Church, not a Baptist, but it is very much ran in the old traditions that my mom would have loved.

I first entered this church late last summer.

My daughter, Carson who is 8 years old was watching Youtube and modern shows. Every one of those shows is absolutely aimed at 8 year olds, but not appropriate for 8 year olds....As I thought about that, I realized that when I was a kid, TV was just better, I watched The Waltons, Little House on the Prairie...that sort of thing.

So I found them on a streaming service and started playing them when Carson was in the room.

I did not think she was paying much attention but by episode 3 of Little House, she asked me "Daddy, Why don't WE go to church?"

I asked her if she wanted to go, and she was pretty excited about it. Now, I had to find a church. I immediately though of this one, as it is 100 yards from our house. a quick Google search told me that their services are at 8:30 in the morning and over by 9:30 in the morning, so our Sundays could continue as always with family events, shopping, yard work with one little change.

That first Sunday we walked in, there were maybe 12 people in attendance. I thought we went unnoticed to be honest, but the second week, Pastor Parks and his wife had already made plans to start a Sunday School for our daughter. and a 4 minute "Childrens Sermon" he does just for her right before the adult sermon. His wife takes Carson to the Sunday school room and teaches her about the Bible with coloring, games and conversation while the adults enjoy an upbeat sermon with

Because we are losing it. Its going to be closed and sold. Probably developed.

Thge little church that thrived when there were 275 people in Eagle with dirt roads is dying in a Village of over 2000 people because nobody goes anymore. People either stay home or they go to the "Fun Guitar Church" where the music is loud, the coffee bar is flowing and they spend more money on Christmas decoration than Eagle Methodist brings in a year.

What would it take to save it?

5 or 6 families.

I have gathered people together to work on playgrounds, put on Eagle Diamond days in 2020, headed up political rally's but I have no clue how to reach out to peoples souls.

Does anyone have any ideas? Know anyone who, like my family, did not realize they were missing something?

Its a long shot, but I hope we can save this little gem of a church. Once it's gone, its gone.
