Waukesha, Wis.— The Methodist Episcopal church of Eagle Sunday is concluding its two-day celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the founding of the congregation and the sixty-fifth anniversary of the building of the present church.

The Rev. William B. Petherick, pastor of the church, has arranged several special features for the observance.

Sunday night, in services at which 16 new members will be taken into the church, the sermon will center on a scale model of the church, built by the Rev. Petherick. When he mentions the foundation of life, the foundation of the model building will be laid, and so on until the entire model church will be constructed before the congregation.

They'll Cut a Cake

Representatives of the families which organized the first congregation then will place candles about the model.

A three-tier cake with 65 candles will be cut and sold to those taking

part in the observance. More than 100 persons will participate.

All of the older members of the church able to attend were to gather for the services Sunday morning. Among them was Mrs. Emmeline Pardee, daughter of the man in whose barn the first church service was held 100 years ago. Mrs. Pardee observed her eighty-eighth birthday anniversary Sunday.
