Matthias J. Bovee- proprietor of Kline's Hotel, now Sasso's tavern.
Jeremiah Carr- grandfather of Shirley Osborne.
Harvey Clemmons- ran Dadmun mill for many years.
Charles Cox- ran livery stable, which is now Martin Mueller's barn.
Tom Devereau- head of Home Guards in Waukesha. The famous
Eagle diamond was found in his well.
Francis Draper- Mrs. Lila Burton's father. a guard in Washington
during the last part of the war.
Napoleon Draper- brother of Francis.
John Finke- very young when he went to war; good sense of humor.
Jacob Juan Finney- Grandfather of Robert Finney, from the
Genesee area, ran a grocery store, was a carpenter, also
a postmaster.
William Harrison- had a store at Palestine Corners.
Edward P. Hinkley- built the house that was moved onto
the Gerald Nelson farm.
Leonard Hinkley- first white child born in Eagle, the son of
A.R. Hinkley, the first settler here.
John Hubbard- moved to Colorado after the war.
Henry James- lived where Arthur Stocks lives now.
John Kalb- Grandfather of Carl; farmed at Jericho.
Sidney Kline- played in Sousa's band.
Hiram Lampman- lived in a home that stood where the Catholic
Church parking lot is now.
Charles Lins- ran what is now Mealy's store as a Drug store.
brother of John August Lins.
John August Lins- built buildings now Mealy's, Crosswaite's,
and Krestan's, living over the latter.
Merchant of general merchandise and men's
clothing. He participated in the battles
of Williamsburg, Yorktown, Peninsula campaign,
Antietam, Gettysburg, Wilderness, Spottsylvania
Court house, North Anna River, and Cold
Harbor where he was wounded.
George Logan-
William Logan- one of three of the first rural mail carriers.
Joseph Lurvey- came to Eagle in 1900, was a postmaster here.
Norman Markley- known as the village strongman; was the
fastest cradler in Southern Wisconsin.
Adelbert Pardee- enlisted in New York, came to Eagle later.
a cheesemaker, he was the father of Don
and Harold (Aurel's husband).
Andrew J. Reeves- built the house Balls live in; was a carpenter.
Julius Ceaser Reeves- built Mary Breidenbach's house.
Silas Reeves- built the house of Mrs. Driscoll's.
Phil Richart- a carpenter.
William Sherman- built Lueck's house in 1847, Peasly's in 1860.
Matthias Snyder- ran a tavern here and later moved to Waukesha.
John Steinhoff- ancestor of the local Steinhoffs.
William Townsend- lived where Bob Jolliffe lives now.
