Land and Civic Contributions

- In **1660**, James was granted **an island in the Simsbury River** and **50 acres on the mainland**.
- In **1666**, he and John Moses negotiated with **Nassahegan**, a Poquonnoc sachem, to purchase **28,000 acres** for Windsor. For this, he was awarded additional land known as **Tilton's Marsh** [WikiTree](#).

- His involvement in church governance led to tensions over the **Half-Way Covenant**, reflecting his insistence on religious rights and inclusion [WikiTree](#).

Death and Legacy

- Died on **June 11, 1682**, in Windsor, Connecticut, and was buried in **Palisado Cemetery** [Find a Grave](#).
 - His descendants spread across **Connecticut, New York, Massachusetts, Maryland**, and beyond, with over **1,500 documented descendants** spanning 17 generations [FamilySearch](#).
