Wuerl Band Concert To Feature Dancers

A Milwaukee dance group and other guests will be featured with the Wuerl Band Wednesday evening at Sheboygan's Fountain Park Bandshell.

The Sokol-Czech Dancers, under the direction of John D. Erd, will display their talents during the intermission.

The concert will begin at 7:30 p.m.

The dance group was organized in 1943 in order to continue the folk customs of Czechoslovakia and has participated in the Milwaukee Holiday Folk Fair annually for the past 27 years.

The dancers wear colorful hand-made costumes that are fashioned after those worn by Moravian peasants in the early 1900s.

Dance Program

Dances to be performed here Wednesday night include the "Beseda," or visiting dance, a collection of dances from each province in Czechoslovakia, "The Polka from the Bartered Bride," the Prsi Prsi," or the Rain, Rain Polka, a Moravian folk dance.

Milton Schwalbe, baritone soloist and member of the Wuerl Band, will perform the Neopolitan variations, "Napoli," with band accompaniment. Donald Braatz, director of bands at Oostburg and also a Wuerl Band member, will appear as guest conductor with the Henry Hadley Overture, "Youth Triumphant."

Also appearing as a featured soloist with the band will be a drum set solo as Douglas Grube plays Saul Feldsten's "Timetable," accompanied by David Garrison on the electric bass. Both boys are North High School students.
