

Jericho Cemetery, located in the Town of Eagle, Wisconsin, serves as a historical resting place for the area's earliest pioneers.

Historical Foundations

- **Establishment:** While the earliest known graves date back to **1839**, the cemetery was officially established in **1866**.
- **Land Acquisition:** In 1867, William and Mary Wilton sold half an acre of land to the **Jericho Cemetery Association**, which continues to administer the site today.
- **Naming:** The name "Jericho" originated from **Jerry Parsons**, who built the first regular hotel in the area (called Jericho) in 1837; the name combined a syllable of his first name with the biblical city.

Notable Burials and Features

- **Pioneer Families:** The cemetery holds members of significant early families, including the **Wiltons, James, and Powells**.
- **Notable Individuals:**
 - **Jane Powell (1813–1865):** A local rooming house operator whose life is documented by the [Eagle Historical Society](#).
 - **Thomas and Anne James:** Parents of Jane Powell, who died in 1863 at the ages of 99 and 97, respectively.
- **Veterans:** The site includes the graves of veterans from various conflicts, including the **Civil War** and **Korean War**.
- **Records:** Detailed cemetery and family records are maintained by the [Eagle Historical Society](#) for genealogical research.
