Also, remember that while none of the library staff members are official "ACA navigators," we do have several public access Internet computers that you can use to access the marketplace website (www.healthcare.gov) and we will help you to the best of our ability. Just ask.

Holds and Interlibrary Loan Requests – What's the Difference?

As many of you know, the East Troy Library is part of the Lakeshores Library Consortium, which consists of 16 libraries in Racine and Walworth counties. Also, our SHARE online public access catalog (OPAC) actually includes the holdings of the MidWisconsin Consortium libraries as well (for a total of 44 libraries).

Therefore, we have access to many, many more titles than we can fit in our four walls. So how does one get one of these titles delivered right to the East Troy Library? Simply place a "hold" or an "interlibrary loan request." What's the difference? A "hold" is the term we use for an item that is owned by one of the SHARE libraries.

Since Lakeshores operates a van delivery service five-

days a week, "hold" items usually arrive very quickly, especially if the item is not checked out from the owning library when the "hold" is placed. An "interlibrary loan" is an item from a library outside of the SHARE network.

Although, we actually need to place "interlibrary loan" requests on your behalf, both customers and librarians can access a database that includes holdings from all over the state. It's called WISCAT, and it can be accessed through our website at www.easttroy.lib.wi.us. Simply click on "reference and research," "online databases," and then "Badgerlink." Questions? Comments? We're happy to help.

LSTA grants

The library is the recipient a Library Science and Technology Act grant that will allow it to undertake a collaborative project with the East Troy Electric Railroad, the East Troy Viewfinders, and the East Troy Historical Society.

The project involves digitizing a portion of the railroad's collection by taking digital photographs of the physical items in their museum and scanning documents such as old railroad company newsletters.

Then, this material will be incorporated into an online collection called "Recollection Wisconsin," which is an absolute treasure trove of primary historical resources (such as letters, photographs, yearbooks, and maps) from around the state.

Check out the website at www.recollectionwisconsin.org. By this time next year, the East Troy area

should be represented in the collection.

"Thomas Jefferson: Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Everything," by Maira Kalman, is a colorful picture book that can be used to introduce young children to this "founding father."

Jefferson was a very interesting man (with countless hobbies and interests) who not only was one of the original authors of the Declaration of Independence and the third president of the United States.

For example, he was an avid gardener who experimented with growing hundreds of plant varieties from around the world in his thousand-foot-long garden, including Italian broccoli, French figs, Mexican peppers, and beans collected on the Lewis and Clark expedition.

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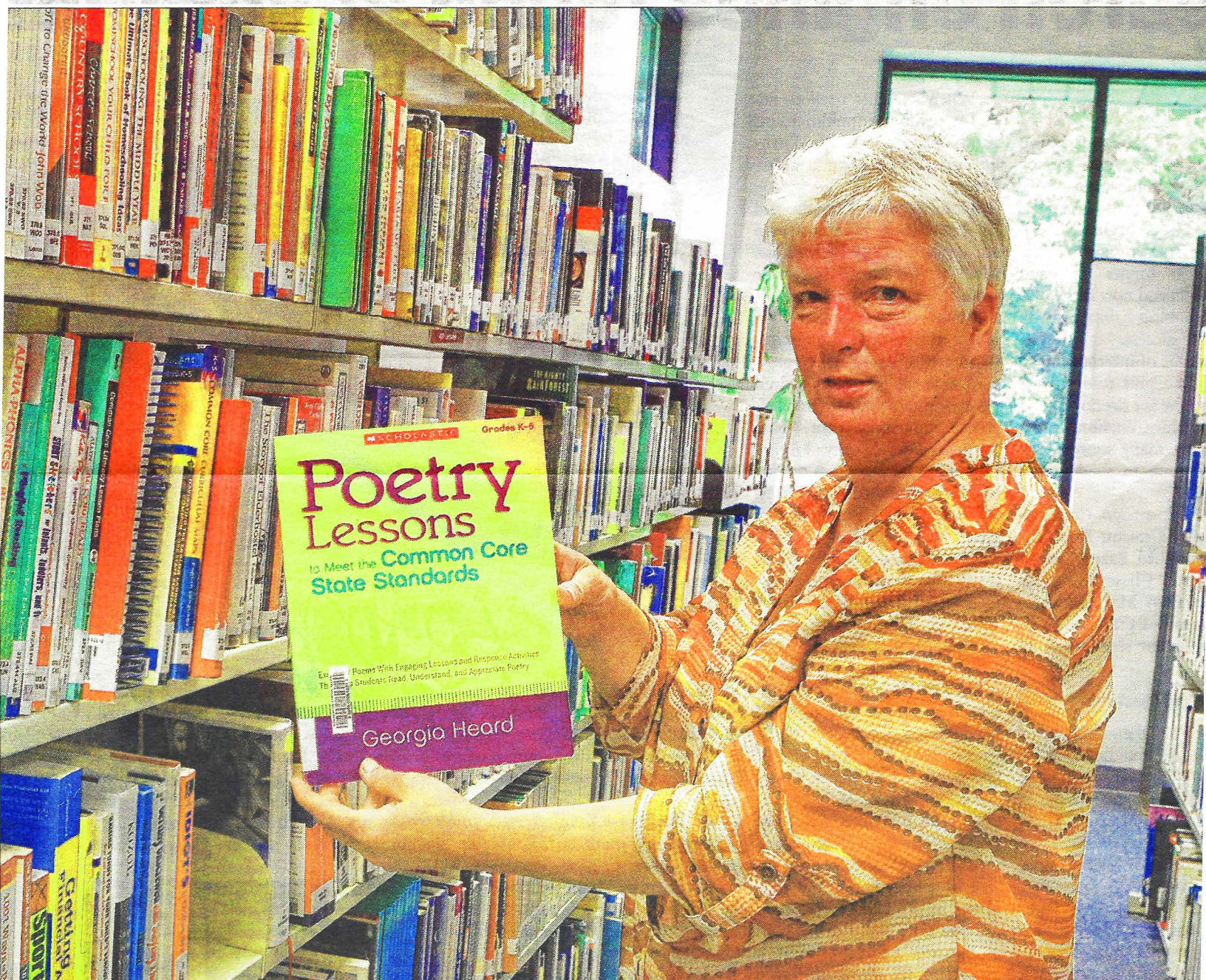

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Help with school work? Original search engines found at libraries

As students head back to school, homework routines — or battles — begin again. A student's success during the school year hinges on good study habits and now is the best time to establish habits that will foster that success.

In this age of Internet access, a readily available resource for students may get overlooked — the local library. Yet, libraries offer students many sources that can lead them to solid grades this year.

The Mukwonago Community Library Director Ann Lininger and Alice Baker Library Director Alli Chase and Alice Baker librarian Maria Hinners shared some of the features libraries offer for students of all ages.

Supporting learning

Through the Waukesha County Federated Library System, all Waukesha County libraries offer online databases that go far beyond what a blind Google search or Wikipedia can offer. There are over 30 paid databases that cover everything from authoritative encyclopedias (Britannica online) to peer reviewed articles, to history research to newspapers and more. It's all free and available on the library websites with your library card.

The Learning Express database offers great ways to study and brush up skills with practice tests, exercises, and skill-building courses for elementary through adult students. Gale courses, also known as ed2go, offer six-week interactive, instructor-led classes that can be taken entirely online. A library card holder in good standing is entitled to these courses at no

cost.

When students need to access a computer, public access computers are available. Printing can also be done at either library.

Libraries have friendly and helpful staffs of librarians who are eager to help patrons get what they need from the library — for free. Librarians are available when patrons stop in, via phone or email and also by connecting with us on Facebook.

"We are able to help children with the opportunity to find reference materials not only through our County Library system but we can reach out into the state and across the country to find materials," Hinners said.

The librarians can help patrons learn to use the online databases, find the books they want and need, and much more.

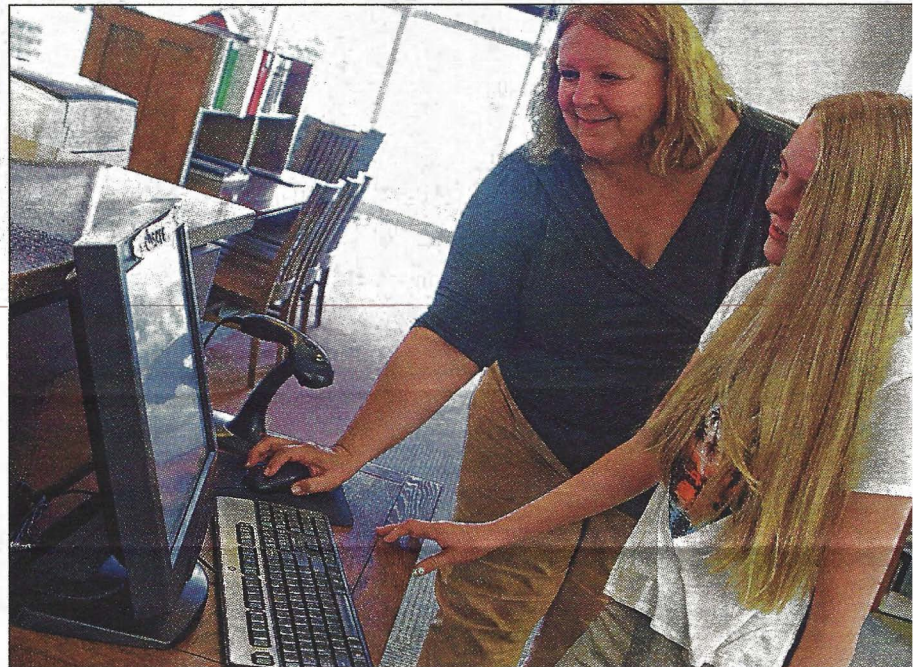
"Librarians are the original search engines and we are still really good at searching out information for our patrons," said Lininger.

If patrons can't find a specific title on the shelf, either library can get it from one of the 16 other libraries in Waukesha County. Public libraries are also great at extending school libraries, as well as supporting school programs, by providing extra copies of book titles.

Libraries also have ongoing programs for families. From early literacy initiatives like 1000 Books Before Kindergarten and story times for preschoolers to programs for teens and adults, there is always something fun going on at the library.

spread out and work on projects. Our Wi-Fi is the fastest in the Village and does not require a password, you can connect anywhere in the building on any device.

✓ The library has dedicated Internet computers for kids and teens and also have laptops available for use in the building.

✓ The library has books available on every topic you can think of and at every reading level. We have nonfiction books from emerging readers through adults to support reports, science fair projects, research, etc. We also have a huge fiction collection for book reports and pleasure reading. We can help you find anything from a picture book to an easy reader to a chapter book to a classic.

✓ Schools often have EBSCO (a reference with nonfiction, magazines, journals, newspapers, and images) available and

students can have access to it at home through our website.
