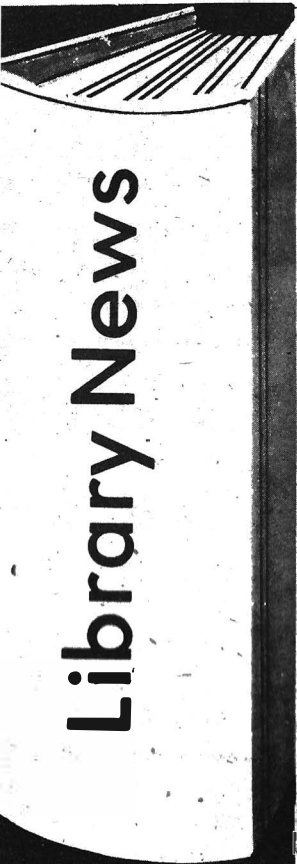

The Eagle Village Board awarded a contract for street resurfacing to Wolf Paving at the board meeting August 5. Several bids were received to repair Homesteader St. and the tennis courts at the park. Total cost for the project will be \$13,761. *SM*

~~Mr. John Daggett~~ reported on the growth of the library under the direction of Betty Isleb. "Betty is responsible for the success of the library and the volunteers," said Daggett. "We now have over 10,000 books with another 3000 to 4000 in storage," he continued. "We have no place to go with them." Over 800 library cards have been issued.

The library is part of the Federated system with funding from both Eagle Town and Eagle Village. A roving van makes any book requested available in a matter of days through the Federated Computer system. "Any book you want, we can get," exclaimed Daggett.

The summer reading program had 60 to 70 children participating. A new

In order for the town of Eagle to know what services the library offers and where it stands financially, the library Board asked to appear at the Board meeting August 12.

Two library representatives, John Daggett and Lance Fanchot, explained

the current library programs and needs. The Alice Baker Memorial Library originated in 1974 and is presently located in the basement of The Methodist Church in Eagle. The library has 800 borrowers and 65-70 children enrolled in

the childrens program, "Through the Looking Glass." "We're busting at the seams," said Daggett, with 10,000 books in one room.

But things may be coming together with local service clubs expressing interest in helping the library. The Partridge Building has been donated as a possible future site for the new library. "It would make a really wonderful library except for the almighty dollar," Daggett said. It would cost as much money to remodel it to meet state standards as it would to build a new building.

The library board is looking for possible financial assistance from the town and village. They currently receive state and federal aid for specific purchases such as reference books. "At

least we're getting that money," Daggett said, but better facilities are desired. Board chairman John Auberger recommended the library board come to the October budget workshop.

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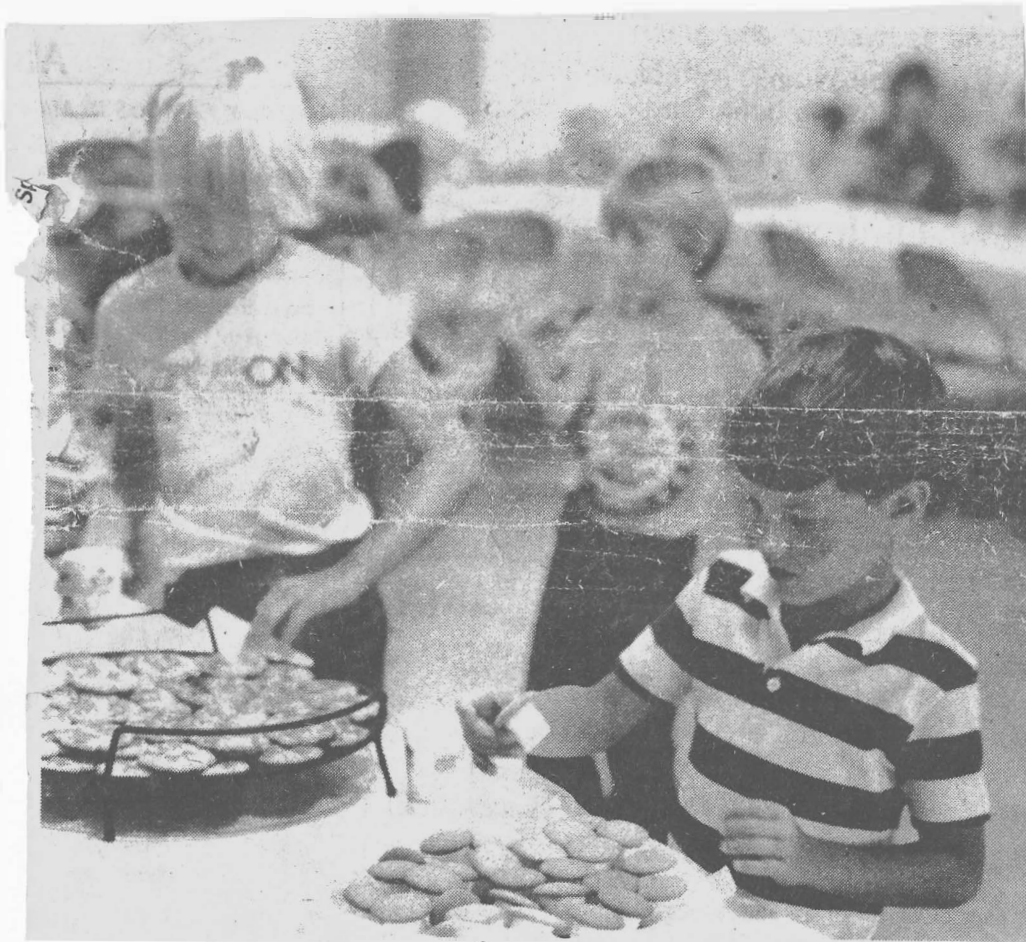

Chief 11-10-82 Library searches for logo

Contests are not a usual part of the activities of the Waukesha County Federated Library System but its logo search is an exception. The System Library Board has decided that the best way to develop a logo that uniquely fits the Library System and its services is to encourage talented Waukesha County residents to design one. For that reason, a \$100 U.S. Government Savings Bond will be awarded to the person who submits the best design in the Library System's Logo Contest which will run through December 3, 1982.

Any resident of Waukesha County may enter one or more designs in the contest but each entry must be submitted separately. All entries will be judged on the basis of artistic merit, how well the design relates to the goals and services of the Waukesha County Federated Library System, and the ease of reproduction and overall adaptability to simple or complex printing. The Library System will use the winning logo design on its stationery, signs, door decals, and publications.

Kathleen Gosz, Director of the Federated Library System, believes that a System logo will not only help identify the Library System but will also serve

as a reminder that the Library System allows every person in Waukesha County (with the exception of the residents of the City of Brookfield which did not join the Federated System) to use any of the 15 member public libraries without regard to local government boundary lines. The Library System funds this open access and also coordinates systemwide services for its member libraries. Among those services are interlibrary loan of materials among the participating libraries by means of a microcomputer network; reference and referral service; van delivery service; a summer children's program at each participating library; and continuing education workshops.
