

Partridge House donated to Eagle Library

Eagle Village President Ralph Raduechel read a letter to the Eagle Village Planning Commission December 30 informing them of the donation of the Partridge House on Main Street in the village as the future home of the Eagle Public Library.

The building will require extensive repairs before it can be used for library purposes. There is water but no septic system.

Local clubs and organizations will be solicited for volunteer labor or funds to ready the house for use.

The Eagle Library, which is currently housed in the Eagle Methodist Church, has outgrown its present facilities. Ten thousand books are in the library. An additional 4,000 are being stored for lack of space. Plans for new facilities have been considered for some time.

Land Use

Library in Eagle seeking a place with more room

Eagle — Officials of the Alice Baker Memorial Library are seeking more space than the current one-room setup at the United Methodist Church, 305 E. Main St.

Library Board members say they can now display only 75% of their 10,000 volumes in the room, and that such activities as children's hours, which ran every Wednesday this summer, are cramped. They are appealing to both the Town and Village Boards for cooperation.

"We have sadly outgrown our present quarters," said John Daggett, a board member. "We simply have to get better facilities."

Librarian Betty Isleb said, "We're bulging out the windows."

Some of the library's books are stored in boxes in a second room in the church, she said. But the church wants those removed so the room can be used for Sunday School.

"We don't even have a place where you can sit down and fill out a library card," she said.

The library pays \$50 per month to rent the room in the church.

Daggett said the board would consider any spot that had sufficient

Superintendent Paul Strobel said that the board still plans to study the three alternates presented to them at the previous meeting. The alternates, which ranged in cost from \$1.5 million to approximately \$5 million, ranged in construction from alleviating code violations to constructing an addition to the school.

At the December 13 board meeting, board members voted down all three alternates. Strobel said that board members still intend to discuss the alternates. He said that the district must

room, was centrally located and provided enough space for parking. No specific plans or cost estimates have been developed.

Daggett presented the case to the Village Board Thursday night. Library representatives also hope to speak to the Town Board at its meeting next Thursday.

The library, which started in 1974, has about 800 borrowers, compared with 209 borrowers at the end of 1977. Its children's program serves nearly 70 children, about 20 of whom are preschoolers.

The library receives \$12,000 per year from the town and village and gets additional money from the county's Federated System and from the State of Wisconsin.

Isleb's salary is \$3,000 this year — "It's the first year in 10 that she's gotten a dime," Daggett said.

The library's three desk workers are each paid \$3 an hour.

As to where to move for a new location would come from, Daggett said, "That's the \$64,000 question." He said that several local civic groups had asked what they could do to help but that those groups had not yet been formally approached for money.

Library News

We wish to share with you the following article written by Mable Thomas, descendant of the first pioneer resident of Eagle, current Library Board member of the Alice Baker Memorial Library.

"The EAGLE PUBLIC LIBRARY was named after ALICE BAKER who came from a pioneer family of Eagle, WI. She was a long-time educator and started her teaching career in 1910 at the Eagleville School. After graduating from Whitewater Normal School, now known as the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, she taught at Eagleville and then Viroqua.

She then went to Montana where she was a botany teacher, and returned some years later to Wisconsin to teach at Whitewater High School, Lancaster and Eau Claire.

Her brother, Earl Baker, had gone to China in 1915 to unify their communication systems and in 1934, Alice

remained two years to teach at the Kuling School in Peking. Her students were the children of American businessmen and missionaries.

Upon her return to Eagle in 1936, she taught at the Eagleville School again, then went into substitute work. She retired in 1945 after teaching at Shullsburg.

Miss Baker was a member of the Writer's Club, and wrote numerous articles for "Landmark," the Waukesha County Historical Society's publication.

Alice Baker was dedicated to the need for a public library in Eagle and devoted much time and effort to make it possible. However, she died April 15, 1974, at the age of 91 without the knowledge that a library would be established within the next few months and that it would be named in her honor."

The Alice Baker Memorial Library Board presented an appeal for additional funds to the Eagle Village Board October 6. Valued at approximately \$45,000, the gift of the Partridge property will need remodeling estimated at \$55,000 before it will be functional.

The library presently operates from borrowed space at the Eagle United Methodist Church. The church has grown to the point where the additional space is needed for Sunday School classrooms.

Newell Meyer, newly appointed library board chairman, reported 500 books were loaned out in 1974, the first year of operation. Since that time,

it has continued to grow with 12,000 plus books being loaned this year. As new books are added to the shelves, old ones are put on sale as shelf space is very limited. One student stated she had a hard time getting books off the shelf and when she asked for assistance, the librarian immediately put eighteen books up for sale. The student bought seven, but

insists her shelves at home are becoming congested as well. The letter continued to say the aisles at the library are so narrow that two normal sized people have problems passing each other.

Plans continue on new Eagle Library

EAGLE VILLAGE -

Final drawings for the renovation of the Edna Partridge house were presented to the Eagle Village Board November 3. Arthur Isleb, member of the building committee for the Alice Baker Memorial Library explained the drawings.

Compared with 300 square feet the library now occupies in the Eagle United Methodist Church, the new library will have 925 square feet. Donated to the library last December, the building is valued at \$45,000. An additional \$55,000 is needed to

complete the renovations.

The Village Board agreed, by motion, to match the sum of \$25,000 donated by the Eagle Town Board.

Bids for the construction work will be let in January of 1984.

The board also reviewed the present contract held by Matteson Waste Removal for garbage collection. Matteson's contract was to terminate at the end of December, 1984. But a merger with Valley Sanitation made a review necessary. A decision will be made in the

future.

Other action taken was adoption of Ordinance 112 amending Section 9 of the Municipal Code of Zoning ordinances regarding fees for zoning and building permits. The fee schedule will be deleted from the text. Figures will be available from the village clerk.

Ordinance 113 concerning abandoned wells was carried. Existing wells must be abandoned and sealed, specified by DNR rules within 30 days of purchase of property.

An ordinance which

would limit overnight street parking in the village was tabled until board members can review it and make recommendations.

A suggestion to reduce the speed limit on South Street south of Main was made by Police Chief Hans Lux. School children are present in the area. It was also noted that the intersection of South and Meadow Lane near Grove is particularly bad. No action was taken at this time.

Federal Revenue Sharing will be the topic of discussion November 17 at 7:30 p.m. A Public Hearing for the 1984 budget will

follow at 8 p.m. A special board meeting will be held immediately after to adopt the budget. All residents are encouraged to attend.
